The Ministry Sustained Only by the Casting Vote of the Speaker - British Guns at Delagon Bay.

The Chamber was crowded and the debate was of the most excited character. But the resolution was finally rejected by the casting vote of the Speaker of the House. Sir J. Gordon Sprigg, the Prime Minister and Treasurer, presented the budget to the House of Assembly. It showed a surplus of £250,000 in the estimated receipts over the expenditures. The budget contained a proposal for an increase in the strength of the Cape mount-

ed rifles at an annual cost of £23,000. This increase is asked for on the ground that it is necessary for the protection of native It is announced here that the commander
