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

EATEN BY CANNIBALS.

The Horrible Fate of a Young Englishman Named Lichtenberg Who Went to the South Sea Islands.

Astoria, Oregon, May &-According to private advices received here yesterday, F. M. B. Lichtenberg, a young Englishman, who arrived in this city about two years ago, and left a year later, has met a hor-rible fate at the hands of cannibals in the South Sea Islands. He and another man were captured, killed and eaten by the directly from Astoria, together with a former missionary, whose name is not known, to trade with the natives of the Santa Cruz Islands, which have a popula tion of about 30,000. The former missionary had traded with them before, and, having been among them in his religious capao ity, entertained no fears for the safety of himself and his companion. The men procured traders' outfits, and set sall from Australia for the islands. The natives, who are said to be more feroclous than any of the African tribes, captured and held them for some time. Later they were killed and eaten. The story gained circulation through a half-civilized native, who witnessed the awful feast. Lichtenberg belonged to a prominent London family.

A GREAT BIG SCHEME To Build an Immense Departmental Living House in Toronto With a

Roof Garden.

Toronto, May 10. A great, big scheme is on foot in Toronto to build an immense departmental living house. The promoters are known as the Toronto Industrial Club (Limited), with a proposed capital stock of \$300,000, divided into 30,000 \$10 one, 200 feet square, and six or eight storeys high. It is proposed to erect it in the central part of the city and to have an immense restaurant in the basement capable of seating 600 people. A big concert hall is also part of the scheme, and on the roof there is to be a magnificent promenade and roof garden. The building is to contain 600 beds, and, as the prospectus says, this will add to much-needed hotel accommodation in Toronto. The promoters expect to fill all these rooms with students transients and families who are now living in places and houses that do not offer the same attractions. It is expected that this monster establishment will do away with many of the old rookeries in certain parts of the city. The pros-pectus is now being circulated in the city and bears the name of William Clark, D. C. L., as chairman of the oreliminary meetings, and D. W. Ross. B. A., as secretary.


