New York, May 15 .- Lee and Frank Stevens, the aeronauts, of New York City, who it was believed were drowned brought to Long Branch to-night on the schooner Mary Jane, Capt. Conroy. They were picked up on Wednesday night by the captain of the schooner ten miles off Highland Light, below Sandy Hook. It was their balloon which was seen to drop into the sea on Thursday by William Furrie, the Sandy Hook pilot.

The Stevens brothers told a thrilling story of their adventures and rescue. They made the ascension in order to test a patent gas generator which would allow them to remain in the air indefinitely. An air current drove them out of their course and they were carried out to sea. They cut their car loose from the balloon. The car was made of willow and had a canvas covering. They were about 400 feet high at the time. They dropped into the sea, and for six hours they clung to the car, and just as they were about giving up in despair the schooner Mary Jane hove in sight and took them aboard.

The Turk Adv nce Upon Domokos in Force.

Greeks Forced Back After a Battle of Seven Hours Against Great Odds-Turks Said to Have Occupied Domokos, But Greek Reports Do Not Admit Defeat, Headquarters of the Greek Army, Domo-

kos, May 17, 4 p.m.-The Turkish attack on the Greek right wing began at 2 o'clock this afternoon, but the flank attacks are considered to be feints, and it is believed the main attack of the Turks will be made upon the Green centre, where Crown Prince Constantine is in command. Two Greek cannon are doing great exe-cution on the principal Turkish column, which is advancing through the hills. The Turkish infantry at several points is in contact with the Greeks. It is believed here that the attack on General Smolenski, near Almyros, is only a strategic operation, and that the Turks will endeavor to cut between the two 2 Greek armies, occupy the road leading to the Othry Mountains, and thus cut off the retreat of the Crown Prince.

The stubbern resistance and plendid vigor of our troops finally comvilled the enemy to give way altogether. All the attacks on our left were similarly repulsed. On our right we did not fare so well. The first attack of the enemy was repulsed, but they massed in immense forces for the next attack. Our first line wavered and was broken and the wing would have been turned but for the timely arrival of the reserves. Still the enemy had gained ground, which it was then im-

possible to regain, and we, therefore, fell back on Bousi. The Turks had 50,000 troops, with 30,000 reserves. Our forces was only 35,000. We have lost heavily, but the enemy must have lost thousands. EARTHQUAKES AND DEATH.

Terrible Loss of Life in the Leeward Islands-Scores Killed in Gundaloupe and Montserrat.

New York, May 12 .- The Journal and Advertiser says: 'Earthquakes are shaking the islands of Guadeloupe and Montserrat, of the Leeward group in the West Indies. The cable a few days ago reported that a number had been killed at Guadeloupe. Details were supplied by the Quebec liner Madiana, which arrived here yesterday (Tuesday) from Leeward Island ports. When the steamer reached Antigua, 40 miles from Guadeloupe, on May 1, everyone in port was discussing the shocks. The heaviest had occurred two days before, when 50 negroes had been killed cutright by being buried in the ruins of their houses. In a brick church a congregation of two hundred people were caught by the collapse of the walls and 50 crushed to death. Those in the streets saw the houses sway back and forth and the walls of brick structures crack. The report also said that 25 or 30 people had lost their lives at Point-a-Pitre. Twelve houses of brick in Guadeloupe had been demolished, and scores of others cracked and seamed by the

From Antigua the Madiana steamed Montserrat, arriving there on May There, too, a state of terror existed. That town was rocked like a boat at sea on April 30. Six houses were destroyed, but no lives lost. The island before the earthquake had not been noted for the piety of its people, but while the Madiana was in that port meetings were held at short intervals The inhabitants finally believed that it was on account of their iniquities that they had been visited by earthquakes, and that if they did not turn they would all be utterly destroyed. A Melancholy Case of Suicide at Hespeler -Miss Schwendimann Became Tired of Life.
