Under an act passed at the last session of the Ontario legislature the provisions of the factory act are extended to the shops and other places. For instance, children under ten years cannot be employed in shops. No child, young girl or woman can be employed in any shop before 7 a. m. or after 6 p. m., except on non-day meal, and when female employees have to work after 6 p. m. on the special days forty-five minutes shall be allowed for the evening meal. A grievance of many stores are kept standing for a long time to the injury of their health. This law provides that the employer must provide a chair for his female employee, and he must allow her to use it if it does not interfere with her work.

THE SESSIONS HELD IN ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH.

The Closing Proceedings - Votes of Thanks and Other Business.

Wednesday Afternoon Session. (Continued from last week.) The Synod resumed at 2:15 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, the moderator presiding. The entire afternoon was resigned to the transaction of Synodical business, the various matters being handled with good judgment and order.

Rev. Mr. Fraser, of Bowmanville, introduced the case of Robt. Bailey, of the Port Credit congregation, who had been removed. He had appealed to the church courts, and thus the matter was carried to Synod for a pronouncement. Some of the ministers maintained that the parties in the case should have been cited to appear, but it was pointed out that a number of the members of the church had been absent, and that the only parties present were present—the only parties present being the petitioners. The proposal was to take evidence, but it was finally agreed to cite the moderator to appear before the court of investigation appointed by the Synod in the morning.

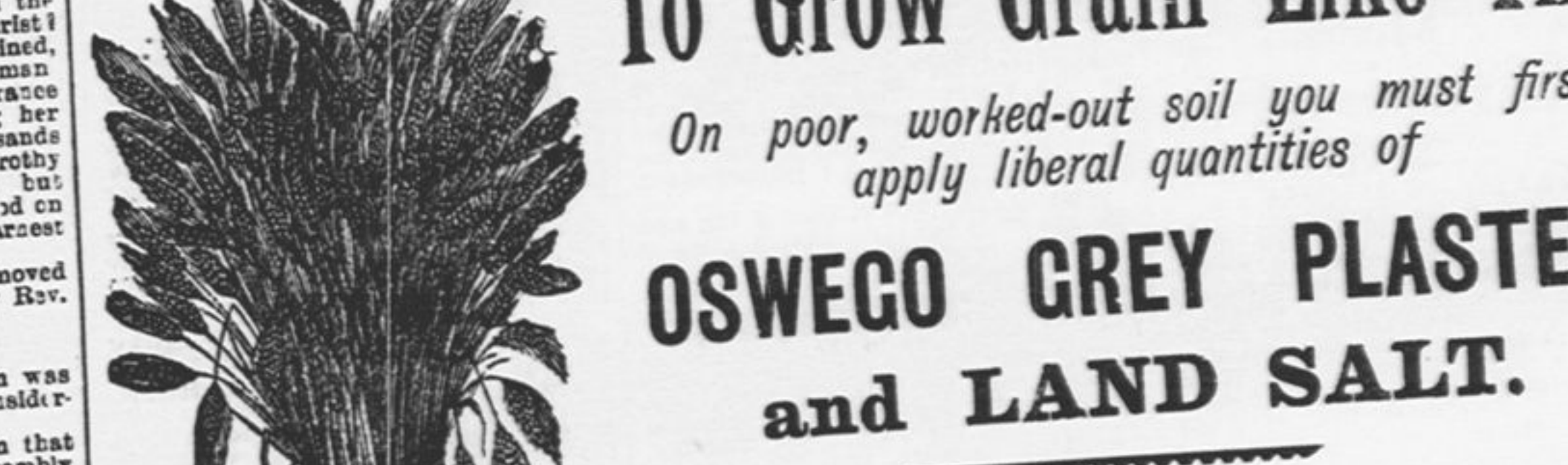
