Important Advice for Merchants who Handle Butter—Must be Fresh and Uniform in Color to Sell in the English Market.

Messrs. D. Gunn Brothers & Co., the well-known provision and commission merchants of Toronto, have issued the following circular with reference to the selection, handling and care of butter:

The Dominion and provincial governments during the last few years have done much to encourage butter making in Canada. A great deal of advice has been given to the producers of butter makers who would be competent to produce an article second to none in quality.
