### TRADE IN CANADA.

Bradstreet's Report Says Seeding Conditions in Ontario Are Favorable-Manufacturers Are Cautious.

New York, May 21.-Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: Seeding conditions in the Province of Ontario are favorable and the grain acreage there will be increased. General trade is dull at Montreal, as proposed amendments to the new tariff have not been settled, and manufacturers prefer to go slowly. Farming operations have been interfered with by wet and cold weather in the Province of Quebec, as well as in Nova Scotia. Business is somewhat improved at Halifax. and in Prince Edward Island. There is only a moderate volume of business at St. John, N. B. Bank clearings at Winnipeg, Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal and Halifax this week amount to \$21,688,000, compared with \$22,237,-000 last week, and with \$19,821,000 in the week last year. There are 21 business failures reported for the Dominion of Canada this week, compared with 31 last week, 28 in the week a year ago and 25 two years ago.
