Orangeville, May 20.-The most important Crown witness this morning in the trial of David Ballard, Reid and Corbett, for arson, was John Tisdale, brother of Hamilton Tisdale, the Crown's star witness of yesterday. John J. Tisdale was only 17 years of age in 1894, when he worked a farm belonging to Dave Ballard in Melancthon Township on shares. Ballard took him into his confidence both before and after this fire, telling him Reid, Corbett and the Tisdales had also had a hand in it. After the fire Ballard and Turner spread coal oil upon some charred chaff, to make it burn more and put up a better apcame around. Under cross-examination Turner admitted that he had had three crooked fires himself, but lenied that he had ever committed perjury in connection therewith.
