Dufferin County Lic. nse Board Determines to Secure a Retorm from a Sanitary Standpoint.

Toronto Star: The unsanitary condition of the country hotels in the province is becoming so notorious a fact that in some places where the licens; boards have sufficient backbone, stringent measures for reform are being taken. The Star has pointed out the grave danger of allowing hotelkeepers throughout the country to leave the - sanitation of their houses as a secondary matter. As an instance of what can be done to institute the necessary reforms, these particulars of the action of the Dufferin County license commissioners have been taken from the Orangeville Post:

In the townships of East Garafraxa, Amaranth, East Luther and Melancthon, the local option exists. in the two remaining townships of Mono and Mulmur there are only four hotels, and the inspectors reported against the sanitary condition of these Accordingly the renewal of the licenses was made conditional, a time being set for the institution of improvements. In Shelbourne the same method was pursued, four conditional licenses being granted. Three extensions were granted in Grand Valley, with stipulations that proper sheds are to be built and repairs made to the interior of the hotels. The board was sharp and peremptory in dealing with the Orangeville tavern applications. The inspector reported that the American, Queen's Gordon house, Grand Central, Paisley house and Royal had not constructed the proper water closests and the consideration of the applications of these hotels was deferred. The Secretary for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, said that the Government had made proposals to the Governments of Canada and Australia on the subject, but that no final agreement had been made. Statements which appeared in the press, Mr. Chamberlain said, did not accurately represent the proposals made.

With reference to New Zealand's offer to send volunteers to Samoa, the Parliamentary Secretary for the Foreign Office, Right Hon. William St. John Broderick, aid that the offer had been declined, as the Government considered the naval force now at Samoa as sufficient to cope with the exigencies of the situation. The Government, however, Mr. Broderick said, expressed its high appreciation of New Zealand's offer.

Agreement With Russia. London, May 1 .- The annual banquet of the Royal Academy was held at Burlington House on Saturday evening. Replying to the toast to "Her Majesty and Her Ministers," Lord Salisbury said he did not wish to exaggerate the extent of the gratifying agreement signed with Russia, but in view of the relations which in the course of the last half century had from time to time prevailed between the two great countries, it was a matter for congratulation that they had come to an agreement with respect to China, which likelihood of a collision between the interests and objects of the two countries for the future.

Continuing, the Premier said: "We have talked of alliances. In a certain sense the phrase is a just one, but an alliance in the sense that with any nation we will go out to war together, and bear the cost and danger together and for each other, can only very rarely take place. The alliances of which we speak are alliances of good feeling between peoples and governments, and not engagements likely to bring either side into war."

Referring to the international conterence to be held shortly at The Hague, Lord Salisbury said: "Whether the peace conference will effect any improvement in the relations of the nations we do not know, but the fact that such a conference has been summoned is a good omen for future peace, and an augury on which all who value the interests of peace, civilization and Christianity may fitly dwell."

HALLUCINATIONS.

The Murderer and Suicide Was an Industrious and Honest Man, Engineer at the Waterworks, But Had Been Rendered Morose Through Recent Sicknesses-Details of

the Tragedy. Peterboro, May 1 .- An awful double tragedy was enacted here on Saturday afternoon, which has shocked the entire community. John Webber, a man about 60 years of age, who was employed as engineer of the waterworks pumping station, shot and killed his wife and then turning the revolver on himself with a single ball in the right temple ended his

The awful tragedy occurred about 2 o'clock, and as far as can be' learned was witnessed by no one. The Webber family were just moving into the house, 814 Water street, where the tragedy occurred and the children were absent at the time.

The son, Lloyd Webber, a youth of about 16 or so, states that he had not left the house himself more than ten minutes, and was over near the adjacent corner when he heard the shots. He ran back to the house and saw his mother lying dead just near the shed at the rear. He ran to give the alarm. He did not know of the suicide at that time. Mrs. McCormick first heard screams from the back of the Webber house, and Mrs. Webber crying out, "Stop, John!" or words to that effect. She heard three or four screams and about the same number of shots, although she did not know they were shots at the time. Shortly after one of the Webber children rushed into her house, crying that his mother was dead. The police arrived about 2 o'clock and kept back the large and curious crowd which had arrived by this time. About 2.30 Coroner Bell arrived at the place, and an examination and inquiry showed an inquest was unnecessary.

The unfortunate woman had been killed by two bullets, one of which entered the left cheek and shattered the teeth and jaw and the other had struck her in the back of the neck. Death had been almost instantaneous. Only the one ball, which entered the head at the right temple, was fired by the man to end his own life. The tragedy was the work of a man of unbalanced mind. John Webber was a native of the town, about 60 years of age, and was respected as an industrious, honest man. He was a carpenter by trade, but since 1882 had been employed as one of the engineers at the waterworks pumping station. 


