A CRAOK AT HOTEL MEN.

Dufferin County License Board Determined to Secure Reform from a Sanitary standpoint.

Toronto Star: The unsanitary condition of the country hotels in the province is becoming so notorious a fact that in some places where the license boards have sufficient backbone, stringent measures for reform are being taken.

In the townships of East Garafraxa, Amaranth, East Luther and Madoc, there are only four hotels, and the inspectors reported against the sanitary condition of these hotels.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Fraternal societies that accept the conditions of the Dominion act now proposed show their faith in the soundness of the insurance scheme under which they operate.

Wisconsin has adopted a new marriage law which requires the license to be taken out five days before the ceremony is performed.

A corporation calling itself the Standard Gas and Oil Company, has secured possession of the Essex gas fields.

A Michigan saloon-keeper is the defendant in a \$10,000 damage suit, brought by the guardian of a four-year-old girl whose father's death is blamed on the liquor dealer who continued to furnish him with liquor after being warned to desist.

Speaking of the proposed recall of the bulk of the troops in the Yukon the minister of finance in the house the other day said: "I thought until lately, perhaps, we would not need them, perhaps they might as well be brought home after law and order have been established there; but, sir, if honorable gentlemen opposite are going to make speeches such as have come from influential men in this house, if honorable gentlemen occupying the first rank in one of the great political parties in this country are going to lay down as a doctrine that the money we have collected from the royalties in that country does not belong to the people of Canada, but belongs to the foreign miners out there, if we are going to have these honorable gentlemen enouncing the doctrine that the money in that country is to be divided between the foreign and the Canadian miner, then I say we will have to take care that the trade will come from the speeches made on the opposition side of this house."

Few Canadians realize that the Dominion has the most extensive fisheries in the world. The eastern sea coast of the Maritime provinces, from the Bay of Fundy to the Straits of Belle Isle, covers a distance of 5,600 miles, and that of British Columbia 7,180 miles, more than that of Great Britain and Ireland.

SETTING TOWARDS CANADA.

The Tide of Emigration Now Strongly Coming Our Way. London, April 29.--The British Board of Trade returns for the first three months of the current year are very flattering to Canada.

SALISBURY'S HOPEFUL TALK.

The British Premier on the Gratifying Agreement With Russia. London, May 1.--The annual banquet of the Royal Academy was held at Burlington House on Saturday evening.

Continuing, the Premier said: "In certain sense the peace is a just one, but an alliance in the sense that with any nation we will go out to war together, and bear the cost and danger together for each other, can only very rarely take place."

Referring to the international conference to be held shortly at The Hague, Lord Salisbury said: "Whether the peace conference will effect any improvement in the relations of the nations we do not know, but the fact that such a conference has been summoned is a good omen for the future peace, and an augury in which all who value the interests of peace, civilization and Christianity may fitly dwell."

PREFERENTIAL TARIFFS.

Three of the Australian Colonies to Follow Canada's Lead. London, May 1.--At a meeting of the British Empire League held at Eastbourne on Saturday the agent-general of Tasmania, after predicting the speedy and unanimous adoption by Parliament of the Australian Federation bill, added the important announcement that recently he had been able to inform the Secretary of State for the Colonies, Mr. Chamberlain, that three of the Australian colonies were framing tariff bills differentiating in favor of British manufactures and against imports from other countries.

ST. LAWRENCE ROUTE.

Hon. Messrs. Tarte and Sifton Endorse a Georgian Bay-Toronto Railway as a Government Road.

Toronto, April 29.--Hon. J. Israel Tarte and Hon. Clifford Sifton were entertained at luncheon at the National Club yesterday by Mr. A. E. Kemp, president of the Board of Trade.

Hon. Mr. Tarte, after referring to the general Canadian grain trade, said that whatever had to be done must be done at once. Suppose we take 10 or 15 years to talk over, and then the trade will have gone from us.

Hon. Clifford Sifton, Minister of the Interior, after a glowing account of western possibilities, said he was prepared to back the present project, if it would have the trade to Canada. An expense of \$6,000,000 for the road and terminals was a mere nothing if it would benefit the country as much as had been claimed. The matter would receive his sincere and earnest attention.

PETERBORO SHOCKED

Over the Double Shooting of John Webber and His Wife.

VICTIM OF HALLUCINATIONS.

The Murderer and Suicide Was an Industrious and Honest Man, Engineer at the Waterworks, But Had Been Rendered Morose Through Recent Sickness--Details of the Tragedy.

Peterboro, May 1.--An awful double tragedy was enacted here on Saturday afternoon, which has shocked the entire community. John Webber, a man about 60 years of age, was employed as an engine-driver at the waterworks pumping station, and shot and killed his wife and then turning the revolver on himself with a single ball in the right temple ended his own existence.

The awful tragedy occurred about 2 o'clock, and as far as can be learned was witnessed by no one. The Webber family were just moving into the house, 814 Water street, where the tragedy occurred. The son, Lloyd Webber, a youth of about 16 or so, states that he had not left the house himself more than ten minutes, and was over near the adjacent corner when he heard the shots. He ran back to the house and saw his mother lying dead just near the shed at the rear. He ran to give the alarm. He did not know of the suicide at that time. There was, he states, nothing whatever wrong at the house when he left it.

Mr. Webber's body lay just at the entrance to the house shed. The body of Webber lay in the back room in the main wing of the house, the kitchen, where the neighbors entered, and was lying flat on his back with his head towards the door. The instrument of death, a pocket revolver, lay between his legs as if he had dropped it when he fell backwards. A small stream of blood issued from a bullet hole in the temple just above and back of the eye. This was the only mark on him, as he showed no other wounds. There was blood on his hands and a few drops of it on the floor beside him.

He had evidently entered the house and shot himself deliberately after committing the murder. The house where the deeds were committed is a double house, the two parts being separated by a barrier between the verandahs. Mr. John McCormick, the family live in the north part, and the Webber family were just moving into the lower half, a quantity of their furniture being still lying about the shed in the rear.

Mr. McCormick first heard screams from the back of the Webber house, and he ran to the scene. She had three or four shots, and about the same number of screams, although she did not know they were shots until she saw the blood on the Webber children rushed into the house, crying that his mother was dead. The police arrived about 2 o'clock and kept back the large and curious crowd which had gathered at the scene.

DEATH'S RECORD.

Kirkville's List Has 52 Dead and 128 Injured--Newton's List 11 Dead, 32 Injured.

St. Louis, Mo., May 1.--The roll of killed and injured at Kirkville, Mo., where half the residence population was destroyed by a tornado Thursday evening, has been revised, and shows the names of 52 dead and 128 injured. At least a dozen of the injured are so badly hurt that their lives are despaired of.

PROHIBITION BY PROVINCES.

Ottawa, May 1.--The committee appointed by the Dominion Alliance to draft a resolution for presentation to Parliament calling for action as the result of the prohibition plebiscite met on Saturday morning. A resolution was drafted which will appear on the order paper early next week, and in which they look for the sympathetic consideration of the Government in legislation for total prohibition of the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicants, provided, however, that the same shall only be operative in such provinces as agree to conform and accept the principle by popular vote.

A GREAT GALAXY OF TALENT.

Mr. Tarte on "Our National Highways," Mr. Sifton on "Our Great West," and Mr. Patterson on "Our Commercial Interests." Mr. Fraser Wins the Freedom of the Town.

Brantford, April 29.--The Young Liberals of Brantford had their annual banquet last night in the Kerby House three distinguished members of the Dominion Cabinet and a most popular and eloquent member of the House of Commons.

In obtaining such a galaxy of talent for their annual celebration the Brantford Young Liberals were exceedingly fortunate. Either one of the guests mentioned would have been a great attraction in himself, but together they formed an irresistible combination.

Subjects Happily Chosen.

The subjects of the addresses were happily chosen, and allowed each Minister to speak more particularly of the branch of service which he administers. For example, the Minister of Customs was called upon to respond to the toast of "Our Commercial Interests," the Minister of Public Works to that of "Our National Highways" and the Minister of the Interior to that of "Our Great West."

A Regrettable Absence.

There was just one regrettable feature about the gathering, and that was the absence of Hon. St. Hardy. Brantford, however, experienced so much benefit from his sojourn at Atlantic City that he decided to take a further rest of a few days before returning to the cares of office, and was reluctantly obliged to forward his apologies for absence.

Vancouver, B.C., May 1.--The officers of the steamer Cutch, which arrived from the north on Saturday night, report from Porepine District that a recent meeting of United States miners indignation was expressed at the rumor spread about of friction between themselves and Canadian police, and a committee was appointed to write to the press to inform the people that the "utmost harmony prevails in this district between the miners and the Northwest Mounted Police, notwithstanding malicious reports to the contrary."

Deadman's Island B.C.'s Property.

Vancouver, B.C., May 1.--Chief Commissioner of Lands and Works Carter Cotton, after investigation in the records, reports that Deadman's Island, Stanley Park and Point Grey belong to the Provincial Government, and that the province will take steps to conserve rights.
