UNBUSINESSLIKE METHODS.

It might be interesting at the present juncture in municipal affairs to quote a few eloquent passages from Mayor Walters' inaugural address at the first meeting of the present council in January last. It read well-it had point, pith and breadth-and after expressing satisfaction because of an awakened public interest in municipal affairs it made mention of an aggree sive policy of improvements to be inaugurated.

The document was fyled for future

reference, and might profitably be given a second reading any time. So far the only evidence of an aggressive policy discernible without microscopic aid lies in the motion passed to exclude newspaper reporters from the meetings of council in committee. Heretofore, in the days of ward politicians and carely the grown -the man who made a practise of voting one way in committee and another way in council-was held up to public scorn, and it is cause for regret that the first step taken by our new council of business men was not calculated to retain the confidence of the ratepayers, rather than alienate it by shewing an aversion for above-board Fair-ave. methods. There are men in the council who are above suspicion, but the ma-

jorities of others at the polls were not so overwhelming as to betoken overweening trust on the part; of the ratepayers. Already this year we have had a sad instance of the wavering of men not upheld by a high sense of duty, and secret meetings have a tendency to promote that sort of thing. The people were promised a vigorous policy-a betterment of methods everywhere-but so far they have looked in vain for the fulfilment of the pre-election program. The policy so far has not been vigorous-it has been halting and hesitating. We are

well into the fifth month of the new year, yet nothing has been said concerning sewerage or granolithic walk matters. Has the council decided to follow out the separate pipe system initiated by last year's council, or is the surface water to be drained into the sewage pipe, in order that the latter may be kept well flushed? What about a sewer on Kent-st., north side, to do away with private drains discharging into the river at various points? Is it the intention of council to construct a granolithic walk this spring on the south side of Kent-st., as planned last year, and leave the offer for the skeleton for mounting north side as it is? Is it the purpose purposes of council to finish the Lindsay-st. road to Kent-st., or has it been decided to construct a few more rods of model roadway here and there throughout the town as object lessons ? These are points citizens are anxious to be en-

lightened upon. In the spring of '98, before Mr. Pilkie was appointed street commissioner, Mr. Thos. 
