A Good Idea-Instructions in Improved Butter-Making. Whitby Chronicle.

At the recent session of the local house Hon. John Dryden obtained a vote of credit to enable him to carry out an idea which we fancy should result in something very useful. He has conceived an idea that good deal of instruction in farm dairying could be imparted by arranging for number of visits to the different centres of agriculture and conducting a series of experiments in cheese and butter making for the instruction of farmers and their

The plan is to secure a public hall suitable farm building in each locality and call the inhabitants of the neighborhood together. One of the professors of the model farm would attend with the best butter and cheese making, and would conduct a series of experiments in the presence of all who might choose to come and see. Milk and cream would be treated under all conditions, and the results noted and discussed. The professors at the model farm are quite conversant with most of the difficulties which trouble the cheese or butter makers among the farmers, and

much useful information can be imparted. The immediate result of such a tour among the farmers would be to raise the standard of both home-made butter and cheese.
