Artificial Stone.

Ten parts of silicic acid, powdered and freed from impurities, are mixed with 90 parts of water and 100 of quicklime, all by weight. One hundred parts of the product are mixed with 100 parts of sand and 5 parts of magnesia or fluorspar, and the mass moulded as desired. The articles are allowed to dry for 12 to 24 hours, and subjected to steam pressure under 10 atmospheres pressure for 48 to 72 hours, after which they are treated with boiling saturated calcium chloride solution at a pressure of 10 atmospheres for 6 to 12 hours. They may then be dried by air or the circulation of steam. Marble, magnesia, magnesium limestone, etc., may be substituted for the sand. The stones thus formed are said to resemble marble, sandstone, granite, etc., closely, to be fireproof, and to resist the action of the weather as well as natural stones.-C. 
Clocks of the Hindoos.

In Hindoo countries where our clocks are imported they are kept and used as ornaments about the room, while for keeping track of time the natives do as they have been accustomed to all their lives, and measure it in their own way. Thus at some of the railroad stations where English trains insist on stopping a little copper pot in which a small hole has been bored is placed in a tub full of water. It is supposed that it will take an hour's time to fill the little copper pot with the water that leaks through the hole. At any rate, when the pot is filled and sinks, they believe that an hour has gone by, and the policeman at the station picks it out, empties it and puts it on the top of the water again to measure more time. But if he happens to be talking to some one or to be deep in a nap, he never makes any allowance for the time the little pot has been left under water. He begins to measure the next hour from the moment he picks it up. Time never bothers the people of sunny lands as it bothers us, but perhaps there are not so many trains to catch.

Strengthening the Grape Trellis. The constant change of temperature causes the trellis wires to expand and contract, and the heavy winds during the laden with foliage and fruit, all conspire to loosen the end posts of the trellis line :

hence, the posts need to be set deep and A STRONG TRELLIS. firm and otherwise braced to stand the strain upon them, and to this end the plan shown in the illustration is practiced by many vineyardists. At each end a wire is attached to the first post, near the ground, and to the top of the second post, as shown in the sketch. Where the trellis line is a long and heavy one, a wire is attached near the bottom of the second post and near the top of the third post. Of course by either plan the first post is not braced but, if firmly set, it will readily stand all the strain of the first


