of last week displayed an unmistakably weak sone, and that the prospects for this week would be anything but good, owing to the number of cattle held over for want of buyers, offerings were heavy at the western cattle market Tuesday, there being close on 90 loads for sale, including small stuff. The attendance of both local and outside dealers was large, but cautious buying characterized almost every line of trade and sales were slowly effected, giving a rather dull tone to the market. Receipts last week were 2,604 cattle, 142 sheep and lambs and 1,707

Cattle-With the heavy run we had Tuesday, and the discouraging cables from Great Britain regarding the cattle trade there, little improvement on the markets of last week could be expected. Trade was, if anything, in worse shape, owing to the fact that dealers and drovers were wide apart in their views, the latter claiming the cattle cost as much in the country as they were bid Tuesday. In consequence of this sales were draggy, although before the market closed a large number of cattle changed hands, but as far as we could learn generally in the buyer's favor. Export cattle sold at 41 to 5c, although the larger part of the sales were inside figure, and some good loads were taken at a shade under this. Mr. J. A. Thompson bought 160 exceptionally fine shipping heifers and steers, averaging 1,350 lbs, at 5½c, and this was the top figure paid. John Rogers, J. & J. Dunn and Coffee & Co. were also on the market, but did not do much buying, and are apparently holding off for a while. Good loads of butchers' sold at 3je to 3je; extra choice, 3j to ic, and a lot of semmon cattle changed hands at 2j to 3c. The demand was light and prices were weak, trade being if anything in a worse condition than last Friday. Among the transactions were:

Stockers—Trade was fairly active, and the prices of the closing day of last week again prevailed. One bunch of 50 fine cattle was bought by Mr. Crawford at from 4 to 4½ per b. A considerable number of common beasts changed hands at 3½ to 3½c. The quality of most of the offerings was good, and the major part of the sales took place at from 3½ to 4.2 Sheep and lambs—Only 153 came in and trade was necessarily light. No export sheep offered, and there-was no enquiry for them. Yearlings sold at 5½ to 6c per b, and spring lambs at \$4 to 55 per head.

Calves—There was a decided improvement in

Calves—There was a decided improvement in this line, and all were wanted. Prices were for the most part unchanged, but firmer. Several bunches of good medium weight calves sold at \$8 a piece, but most of the offerings were veals, which brought from \$3 to \$5 apiece. One bunch of 65, averaging 140 lbs, sold at \$5 apiece. Hogs—With nearly 2,000 on the market trade was demoralised, prices ruling weak and lower. About 5c was the top price paid, and this figure was obtained only for the best hogs offered, most of the sales being between 41 and 42c per lb with common stuff, when sold at all, selling away down.
