THE REPTILE FUND. The Globe of Tuesday brings to a close its present chapter of reptile fund revelations with an official list of the tory expenditures in the Quebec district in the campaign of 1887.

Mr. McCarthy condemned the present gerrymander, and admitted that a wrong had been done in passing the gerrymander of 1882. He thought the government was strong enough to do what was right and to undo the wrong of 1882.

THE MACKENZIE MEMORIAL. The question of establishing a suitable memorial to the late Hon. Alexander Mackenzie has been for some time under consideration, and it has been decided to form a fund the interest of which shall be paid to Mrs. Mackenzie during her life, and thereafter to be awarded as scholarships in political science.

A committee has been formed in Toronto with Mr. Robert Jaffray as chairman; Hon. J. M. Gibson, secretary; and Hon. S. H. Blake, treasurer, to receive subscriptions to the fund. Following is a copy of the subscription agreement:
