It is not likely that Sir Richard Cartwright will obtain any very large amount of in-formation from the government in reply to his question, but he will secure the appear-ance in Hansard and in the official votes and proceedings of the house of commons of all the letters, vouchers, and uspers in question, of which the fac-similes have already been given to the public.

SOME AWKWARD QUESTIONS Sir Richard Cartwright has given notice that he will ask a series of questions based on the Globe revelations that will prove very awkward for the government. Among them are the following:-

Whether the prime minister, as the leader of the house or any other member of the government, have called the attention of his excellency to the publication of the said letters and documents, and have conferred with his excellency as to the method of dealing with the said publica-

Whether the postmaster general [Sir Adolphe Caron] has made any statement or explanation to his excellency or to his colleagues, or any of them, in reference to such of the above letters and vouchers as purport to be signed with his name.

Whether the said postmaster-general denies the authenticity of the said letters, or any of them, and whether he alleges

the said letters to be forgeries?
Whether the said postmaster-general, in case he denies the authenticity of the said letters, has taken, or proposes to take any steps to prosecute the Toronto Globe for publishing documents which he alleges Whether in view of the above state

ments, the government have made enquiry of any of the several other persons whose names appear as signatories of the said documents, and whether they admit, or deny, he authenticity of the same? Whether the government, in view of the facts now made public, and especially of the circumstances that those documents. if authentic, prove that upwards of \$112, 000 were expended in twenty-four constituencies, with the knowledge and approval of several members of the cabinet, and many members of parliament, intend to cause a committee of this house to be appointed to investigate into the said matters, and particularly to ascertain from and by whom the said funds were supplied

to the said Hon. Thomas McGreevy.

TWO GEREYMANDERS THWARTED. The plucky fight for county rights made by the member for Russell county has forced the government to the conclusion that the object of gerrymandering the township of Clarence into Prescott would fall, and on Saturday the first minister informed one of his supporters that the government would abandon that section of the redistribution bill. The object of the gerrymander was to induce Mr. Edwards to abandon the field to the tories, but in the two vigorous speeches that he made he convinced the government that the injustice would simply make him fight to finish, and that his opponent would be brought to curse the day when Mr. Haggart undertook by legislation to put the representation of this county in his breeches pocket. Hence the wise discretion of the government in backing down. They have also capitulated to the assaults made by Mr. Devlin on the section of the dividing Ottawa county, and have decided to run the dividing line north and south, instead of the proposed unnatural line east and west. Thus the opposition have already scored two victories for decent legislation and stood out successfully for the rights of the people of at least two important liberal

THE GERRYMANDER UNCONSTITUTIONAL A constitutional question in regard to which Hon. David Mills, Hon. L. H. Davies and Mr. Dalton McCarthy are ranged on the one side would seem to be pretty well settled, but if more was needed the opinion of Hon. William Macdougall, Q.C., furnishes it. The point was the incompetency of parliament under the constitution to readjust the boundaries of constituencies in a measure of redistribution of seats. The opinion of Mr. Macdougall on current political events would not perhaps exert any influence at this date, but as one of the fathers of confederation who assisted in framing the act of confederation which forms our constituton the smoke and flames above the tion, his opinion on the intention of the framers of that act carries some weight. In a letter to the Free Press, signed "One of the Fathers," the hon, gentleman says: "Your correspondent submits that the obvious meaning and purpose of the framers of the British North American Act, 1867, was to provide a special 'authority' outside of parliament for the decennial readjustment of the representation. They had heard of that detestable fraud, the gerrymander, and desired to exclude it if possible from our new Dominion. The pretence that the framers of section 51 intended by the words, "Shall be readjusted by such authority, in such manner and from such time as the parliament of Canada provides, meant or can be construed to mean that parliament need not provide any 'authority,' nor specify the 'manner' nor limit the 'time,' but may ignore the fundamental law and usury the function for itself, is an insult to their intelligence and a dishonor to their memory. ....The cabinet was in session all Friday mo ning. It was currently reported that cablegrams had been received from the imperial government urging Sir John Thompson to go to England at once in his capacity as Behring Sea arbitrator and that the cabinet was considering the propriety of dropping for the present session those clauses of the gerry mander act which relate to Ontario and Quebec, with the view of winding up the business of the session. That part relating to Sir John Thompson is not correct. However, the constitutional point raised by Mr. Davies, and supported by eminent legal authority respecting the bill, as well as the attitude of independent conservatives and bickering among their followers, are said to be

### HIS LAST DUEL

Some fifty years ago there lived in the west of Ireland a certain Capt. Fenton. This man had gained an unenvi tole notoriety in his own and the neighboring counties as a successful duellist. Not only was he known to make the most trivial dispute a pretext for a challenge, but it was even reported that on more than one occasion he purposely provoked a quarrel. The meeting, in nearly every instance, ended disastrous-

At that time there happened to be a line regiment stationed in the neighboring town of Galway. Capt. Fenton was on terms of intimacy with some of the officers, and, though far from being a general favorite, it not unfrequently occurred that he dined at the mess on guest nights. But whenever he was present an air of restraint pervaded the assembly. The dinner was sure to be a spiritless affair, and always lacked the tone of good-fellowship which usually character-izes such entertainments.

About six months after its arrival in Galway the regiment was joined by a junior subaltern. He was a mere lad, being still in his teens; yet by all accounts he was a fine, soldierly young fellow. He gave every promise of making a splendid officer, and a few weeks sufficed to establish him as

But, alas! only a short time elapsed before he had the misfortune to fall foul of Capt. Fenton. A challenge was given and accepted. The affair was kept as secret as possible, and at the appointed time the meeting took place in the corner of a meadow about half a mile from the bar-

Not much time was lost in preparations. The combatants were placed, the pistols loaded and the seconds retired. The young officer stood with the full front of his body to his opponent. He was a novice in such affairs, poor boy! It is even said that at the precise moment of firing he involuntarily closed his eyes. If such was the case he never opened them again in this world ! His adversary's ball passed right through to glance of the network of steel.

A stretcher was fetched from the barracks, and the corpse was conveyed thither without delay. The affair would doubtless have caused a profound sensation, but for obvious reasons those engaged in it were careful to let as few particulars as possible leak out.

But on the third day a startling change took place in the aspect of affairs. A young man, travel stained, pale and haggard, arrived in town. Under these circumstances it seemed hopeless to prevent this second duel. Some, indeed, thought of appealing to Capt. Fenton in order to persuade him if possible into refusing the challenge. But none were very eager to undertake such an unpleasant duty, especially as there appeared little likelihood of their efforts being crowned with success.

Nevertheless, there was one who ventured upon the disagreeable task. This was an elderly gentleman, a Mr. Martin, who

He was generally looked upon as a quiet, unassuming old gentleman, who never interfered in any other people's business. In fact, his one aim and object in life seemed to be the welfare of his flocks and herds. But in the present instance, having learned some particulars regarding the late tragedy, he determined if possible, to prevent a repetition of the sad event. With this object in view he called upon Capt.

Though he had turned three-score years, the patriarch of old, "his eye was not dim, nor his natural force abated." A beard of snowy whiteness descended from his weather-beaten countenance. His venerable appearance would in all probably have given considerable weight to his arguments had he to deal with one who respected gray hairs. But, as it was, Capt. Fenton listened to him with ill-concealed contempt. In answer to the old man's remonstrances regarding the result of the recent duel, his reply invariably was that "it served the

young cub right." Mr. Martin entreated him to relinquish his intention of fighting the surviving brother. The intercession was so persistent that, as might have been anticipated, the Captain lost his temper. Turning upon his visitor he abruptly ordered him to leave the house-adding that "he would not allow an old bullock driver to interfere in his

such ungentlemanly conduct," said Mr. Martin, "I insist that my claim shall have preference over all other engagements."
"Oh, certainly," replied the Captain, with mock gravity. "To-morrow morning, if you wish it. I am engaged to meet the young fellow in whom you take such a vast amount of interest in the corner of the big meadow at 8 o'clock. Be there a little before that hour, but don't be late, for l want to dispose of both affairs and return here in time for breakfast." "I shall be punctual, returned the old

gentleman; and without saying more he He was as good as his word. At 7.30 a. m. he was on the ground, attended by his second. Capt. Fenton soon arrived, and later on the party was joined by the brother of the deceased subaltern, with whom was one of the officers from the barracks.

It was fearful to behold the wild look which the young man fixed upon Capt. Fenton. Not once during the preparations did his eyes wander from his brother's slaver. While the pistols were being loaded, Mr. Martin's second whispered to him: "Don't lose a moment when the signal is given. Aim low, it is your only chance."
"No," replied the old man loudly; "I shall strike him full in the head."

It is not known whether this speech reached his opponent's ears and in some measure disconcerted him. It is believed

that the steady gaze of the young man, who thirsted to avenge his brother's death, was not without effect. Certain it is that Capt. Fenton did not take his place with his cus-

The men were posted. The rest retired to a suitable distance, leaving the combatants steadily gazing at each other. A minute or two of terrible suspense followed; during which brief space the silence of death reigned over the spot. Then the signal was given, and, almost instantancously, the two reports were heard. For a few seconds the smoke prevented the spectators from ascertaining the result, but as it slowly rose they saw old Mr. Martin standing erect and firm, while Capt. Fenton was stretched full length upon the

Both the seconds hastened towards their principals. The two men from the barracks also ran to Mr. Martin's side, and eagerly inquired if he was hurt. They found the old gentleman bleeding shightly at the neck, but he carelessly brushed the blood away with the back of his hand. Then turning with a kindly manner toward the youth whom he had risked his life to save, he said, simply :

"I don't think I had any other way of preventing this poor boy from sharing the fate of his brother."

Capt. Fenton's second now advanced, and announced that his man was dead. The bullet had penetrated the left temple. He requested their assistance in removing the body. This they readily granted, but Mr. Martin and his young friend held aloof. As the others raised the dead man they noticed a peculiar hardness and stiffness about the body. On tearing open the garments of the deceased a cry of horror and rage broke from them. They found concealed beneath his clothing a tight-fitting coat

The cause of his having escaped uninjured in so many duels was now fully explained. He had evidently provided himself with this defense from the old armory which his mansion contained. Though doubtless not pertectly bullet proof, yet in nine cases out of ten a ball was almost sure




