MR. BLAKE ACCEPTS.

Mr. Blake has given out for publication the following statement which is practically an acceptance of the invitation to take a seat in the imperial parliament: "Though I would have preferred to await a final conclusion before saying anything with regard to the unanimous invitation of the Irish party to accept an Irish seat in the Imperial House of Commons, yet, in view of its publication and of the many inquiries I have received, it is perhaps better that I should make a brief statement before leaving for Murray Bay.

"On Tuesday last I cabled to the effect that I was deeply sensible of the high honor done me, but feared I was too old and too unfamiliar with the arena to be serviceable; yet, if it were the arena to be serviceable; yet, if it were thought to be in any degree useful to the great cause, I would accept a safe seat, but that I could not attempt a doubtful or costly contest, and it would be rather difficult for me to start forthwith and I recovered. forthwith, and I requested certain particulars

which I thought important, as to the time of leaving and the proposal seat.

The pressure on the time of the Irish leaders is just now so overwhelming, and they are called on to deal with so many matters of infinitely greater moment, that an immediate reply to my inquiries could not reasonably be expected; and I have no further information on the subject.

"This is not the time to give reasons for a decision, which I cannot help sometimes hoping may, after all, be ineffective. I may yet be spared the pain of leaving Canada. Let me just say now that, should it be my lot to go, I can be sustained only by the belief that I go in the discharge of duty, and by the hope that I may before long return to home and friends."

Mr. Blake's acceptance has occasioned general and heart-felt expressions of regret, but there is at the same time very general approval of the course he has decided to take. It is felt that with his great ability and his wide experience of the working of federal institutions, he will at once take a commanding position in the imperial house of commons, and render invaluable assistance in dealing with the questions that confront the statesmen of the motherland.
