It was a powerful defence of the Catholic doctrine of transubstantiation, supported by numerous quotations from scriptures, and was listened to with the deepest attention. At vespers and benediction in the evening the congregation was also very large. The altar was brilliantly illuminated and decorated with flowers, and presented a fine appearance. The singing by the choir at both mass and vespers was particularly good.
