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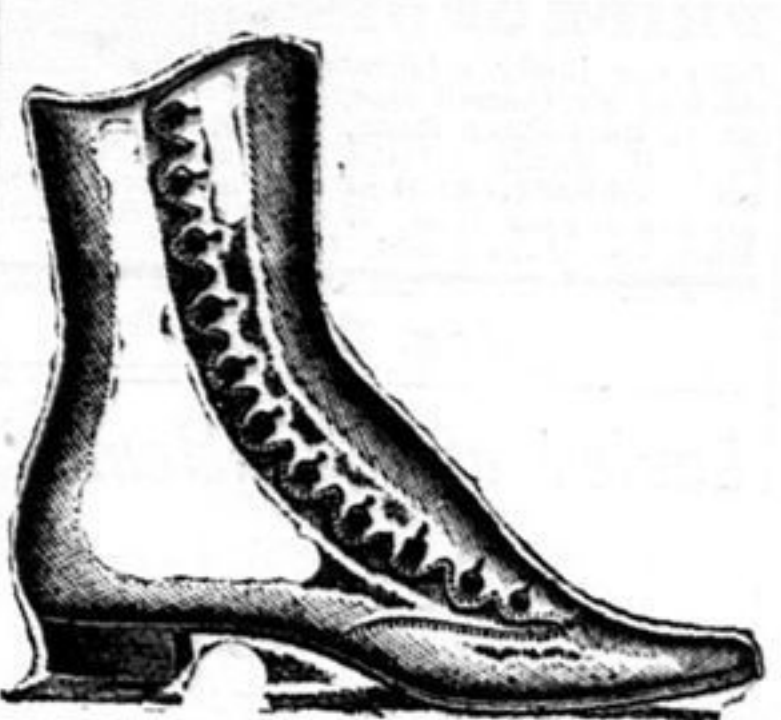

VICTORIA COUNTY COUNCIL.

June Session. The members of the Victoria county council met in the council chamber at the court house Tuesday morning week, pursuant to the standing rules, for the transaction of such business as had accumulated since the January session.

Wednesday's Proceedings. Council met at 11 o'clock, the warden in the chair, and all members present except Messrs. Crandell, Harris and Thompson. Minutes of yesterday were read and confirmed. The warden addressed the council relative to the different matters and documents to be brought before them.

From the clerk of the county of York, enclosing copy of petition to the house of commons, respecting the crossing of public highways by railways.

From the clerk of the county of York, enclosing copy of petition to the legislative assembly, asking that the school laws be distributed to all school trustees free of charge or at cost price.

From the warden and clerk of the county of Frontenac, asking co-operation in seeking increased grant from the legislature to public and separate schools, and that the sum be equally distributed.

On motion of Mr. KELLY, the foregoing documents, not otherwise referred, were referred to the standing committee to which they respectively belonged.
