

Raising the Chicks.

SIRS,-My little chicks this spring are growing off so healthy and strong that I would like to tell beginners in the poultry business something about the way they are managed, for the "entreatment." as the darkeys say, that the little fellows get the first week or two of their lives determines to a great extent the question of life or death.

As with every other young animal, the food given is of paramount importance, and after experimenting with various sorts I find there is nothing more wholesome or more acceptable than egg-bread broken in a pan of sweet milk, and allowed to stand on the stone till it simmers a little and then dries out. This seems to touch the hungry spot exactly, fills the aching little voids, and hushes the insis tent "peep, peep" which every poultrykeeper knows so well. This is given five times a day till the chick is a week old. after which each alternate meal may consist of whole round wheat boiled to bursting. Cared for in this way I usually succeed in raising ten out of every twelve chicks hatched, and that, I think, is an excellent average. If any poultry-keeper, amateur or professional, can show a better record, taking one season from another, I shall learn from each other, and if there is any




