

Offenses Under the Postoffice Act. As a number of convictions have recently been made by the postoffice inspector of this division, we print the general circular issued by the postmaster-general calling attention to the following sections of the Postoffice act, 1886.

Section 93-"Everyone who encloses a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, or in a packet of samples or patterns. being a letter, shall incur a penalty not exceeding \$40 and not less than \$10 in each case." Section 94-"Rveryone who with fraudulent intent removes from any postage stamp any mark which has been made thereon at any

postoffice is guilty of a misdemeanor." Section 108-" Every person who uses or like purpose shall incur a penalty not exceeding
