It is a general audit of the affairs of the government and the country that takes place then, and I say it is well that the audit should be taken. You might as well say a bank inspection might take place every two years. The government has no interest in resisting biennial sessions. If I acceded to that proposal, why, we would be inde-pendent of the legislature for two whole years. This is a very undesirable state of things, and while it would be in our interests that we should be so independent, that we should not have the bother of meeting our opponents every year-it would be a matter of comfort-we opposed it as a matter of duty. Our duty is not merely to think of what is convenient for us, but what is in the public interest and to do what is in the public interest and th what the public interest requires.
