Their Moans and Cries were Pitiful.

THE DOOMED MEN MADE NO. CONFESSION OF GUILT.

A Terrible Crime Explated on the Gallows.

[Special to THE POST.]

ST. THOMAS, June 18th. John Handershott and William D. Welter were hanged here this morning for the murder, on Dec. 14th, 1894, of William Henry Hendershott, nephaw of the former and cousin of the latter.

THE DROP FELL at S.13 o'clock. The condemned men slept the greater part of the night apparently quite sound. Rav. Mr. Spence, who was with them until ten o'clock last night, wasback again at the gaol at 5.45] this morning. The prisoners were already astir and seemingly in the best spirits they had been in for weeks.

A CHANGE PASSED OVER THEM, their countenances became ashen, and as Rav. Mr. Spence read a few selections from the scriptures to them they sobbed most piteously, and wringing their hands frantically, they cried

"OH DEAR, OH DEAR." At 6.35 breakfast was brought in, but though temptingly prepared neither of the condemned men had any disposition to partake of food, although they eagerly drank the nourishing cottee. At 7.30 the gaol doors were opened and the spectators and reporters were admitted.

At 8.05 all was in readiness and the pro-

STARTED FOR THE GALLOWS. The mosnings of the condemned men were frightfui; Hendershott's cries were so loud and so full of anguish that strong men who heard him shuddered. When the procession appeared at the door leading into the gaol yard it was seen that

BOTH MEN WALKED FIRMLY without assistance. On arrival at the scaffold hangman Radeliffe quickly strapped each man's legs together. They were then asked if they had anything to say, but they replied in the negative, where-

THE BLACK CAP was drawn over the culprits, Welter being attended to first. Welter bade the clergyman and the others about him good-bye and stood firmly awaiting the end. Just before the drop fell he said, "Have mercy and compassion." Handershott was very nervous while the hangman was busy with him, and his voice quivered while he said, "Have mercy, Oh Lord, have mercy." The caps being in position the nooses were

CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY. an Interesting Meeting Hold Last Evening-Mr. J. J. Kelso, of Toronto

The local board of the Children's Aid society met in St. Paul's school room last evening, and was addressed by Mr. J. J. Kelso, of Toronto, provincial superintendent of the homeless children of Ontario. On the platform were Mr. D. Ray, president : Dr. Herriman, secretary ; Mr. J. H. Knight, county inspector of schools, and we noticed in the audience Revs. Shorey, Hughson and Mr. Petter Col. Deacon, Messrs. John McSweyn, A. P. McDonnell, Connolly, Hore and Kerr; and

Whiteside, Mrs. Scanes and Miss Twamley. The meeting was opened with prayer by man, stated the object of the meeting and called on Dr. Herriman, secretary, to make a report of what the society had done. The secretary said that the society held monthly meetings, and while they had not done a great deal, he was satisfied that the work was only in its infancy and good results would emanate from the united work of the society. They had rescued two children between the ages of and 9 years, but they had not secured homes for them as yet. They had taken charge of a weak-minded girl of 16 years and had her placed in the asylum at Orillia for the children of her class. There were a number of other children that the society had under their surveillance, and were doing all they possibly could to induce the parents and guardians to bring them under a proper christian influence.

Mr. KNIGHT then referred to the Groves family, of Emily, a case recently brought to his notice. He said there were five children deserted by their parents; three of the children had temporary homes with far mers, and the two youngar ones, four and 2 years of age, were kept in the house of John Lynn, Omemee. Groves, the father. had come to ask him to have the latter two sent to the house of refuge, but as yet he had taken no steps in the matter, as he had learned by enquiry from Rev.
