Death of A Well Known Ops Lady. On Tuesday, morning last Catherine Burns, wife of Mr. Thos. Ray, West Ops, passed away to her eternal reward, having reached the good old age of 79 years and 7 months. The deceased emigrated from Co. Carlow, Ireland, with her parents in 1821, and was married to Mr. Ray in Jefferson county, New York state, in 1833, at the age of 17 years. Mr. Ray came from Co. Wicklow in 1825, when 13 years of age. The young couple settled on the present homestead in Ops in Decmber, 1835, when there were but three houses in Lindsaythen known as Purdy's mills-and endured all the hardships incidental to early pioneer life with fortitude and patience, sweetened by perfect love and understanding. By hard and unremitting toil they made their farm one of the best in the township, and as a family grew up they were in time able in town on Saturday to spend a three to enjoy the leisure they had so richly earned.
