WHAT MR. MCCARTHY SAYS

About the Feeling in Manitoba on the School Question—His Plans—John A. Macdonnell Still in the Field.

Winnipeg, Man., June 1.—In an interview with D'Alton McCarthy, published this morning, he is asked: "When you return east what will be your statement to the public as to the feeling in Manitoba?" and Mr. McCarthy replied: "I have not the imagination of Sir Charles Tupper, but I shall say exactly the truth as to that part of his speech devoted to the subject. People are aroused on the question of school guarding their schools. Ontario friends of the Province need have no fear of the result in the west. Manitoba will remain true to her interests."

"You met with a strong prohibition element in your tour?" "Yes, I frankly told them I was not in favor of total prohibition; my opponent also said he was not a prohibitionist."

"What are your future plans?" "I am expected to speak at a public meeting in Toronto Monday night, but as the train is 12 hours late, I may not be there in time. The balance of the week I shall spend in North Simcoe, and then leave for a ten days' tour through Ontario. I shall not come back to Manitoba before the election day."

John A. Macdonnell, chief engineer of the Provincial Government Public Works Department two months ago was nominated as the Liberal candidate for Selkirk. Last week he declined to retire as a candidate and was nominated to succeed him, but O'Loughlin declined. Then Aid. McCreary of Winnipeg was suggested, but he, too, declined. So Saturday the Liberals waited on Mr. Macdonnell and urged him to re-enter. Finally he yielded, and accepted his position in the Local Government Service.

AND DECIDE TOPUP A CANDIDATE

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THE EX-PREMIER ENLIGHTENS THE BRITISH PEOPLE ON CANADIAN POLITICS

London, June 1.—The St. James Gazette this afternoon publishes a long interview with Sir Mackenzie Bowell, ex-Premier of Canada, on the Pacific Cable Conference and Canadian politics.

Mr. Bowell is quoted as saying he has no doubt that the Conservatives will be successful in the elections unless the school question creates a strong feeling among the people that the Premier thinks it will. He is also quoted as saying that the Liberals were willing to accept reciprocity with the United States, coupled with discrimination against England, but the Conservatives refused to accept the proposition.

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
