Some people may not feel that a potato patch is a paying thing, because last year's crop had to be fed to stock or sold at a York shilling. This may result in a smaller acreage this year, and we shall in all likelihood have a lighter crop, for it is seldom we have anything to compare with last year's great yield. The money is made out of potatoes usually when they are small and few in a hill. We should not wonder greatly if there came a sort of potato famine this year, after such a pler-tiful time in 1895. Potatoes do not keep in stock like wheat. Twelve months is their limit. There is plenty of seed this spring, and plenty of land that farmers scarcely know what to do with, and though we do not set up as a prophet we predict a good return for those who plant potatces this year, and cultivate the ground well.—(Orillia News-Letter.
