The bank, he said, had always been closely identified with the welfare of the town and county, and he had been but the in strument in any good that had been accomplished through the Bank of Montreal. More praise should be given, he felt, to the sterling qualities of the men with whom he had been brought into contact during his life in Lindsay, and this contact had been such a schooling to him that to it he felt he owed his promotion, and he thanked his old friends for it. He would look back upon Lindsay as his home, and long for the occasion when he would revisit it and the many who had been so kind to him. He promised them, though in his new position he might find. it difficult, he would strive hard to live up to the character that had been given him by his Lindsay friends and acquaintances. For the handsome present he thanked the people of Lindsay, Fenelon Falls and county of Victoria. While it should remain in his family for all time to come, he was sure he would not hurt their feelings when he said he appreciated still more than the gift the act of kindness which was behind the gift, and the many acts of kindness that had always been shown to him and to his family, culminating that evening in the large gathering around the table, assembled, as he was told, to rejoice at his success and to regret
