Says If the Greeks Want Him

to Go He'll Go.

Princes Constantine and Nicholas Alse Assume a Defiant Attitude, and George, the Sailor Prince, is Not To Be Found-Latest News by Cable.

London, June 6 .-- A fortnight ago everybody awaited with confidence news of the revolution in Athens and the flight of the royal family. Now, confidence is equally strong the other way. The fact is that King George's philosophic attitude has completely upset the schemes of the revolutionists and disarmed opposition.

"Here I am,"he has been saying in effect, "and here I shall remain if you want me. If you don't, I am quite willing to clear out, bag and baggage. Only say the word and I will go aboard a foreign warship, and you can go to the devil or wherever your childish folly may lead you."

This kind of attitude simply non-plussed the Greeks, who expected the king to flee in despair or appeal to them, cap in hand, to spare the royal feelings. The Crown Prince and his brother Nicholas have taken a similar line. The former takes no pains to placate either the officers or soldiers. He quarrels

with the former with much apparent enjoyment, and bullies the latter. He openly expresses the ardent hope that the negotiations will quickly terminate in military manoeuvres instead of war. Prince Nicholas, when seen by a cor respondent at Thermopylae, the other day, was going about moodily in a dirty tunie and torn trousers. His chief desire was to ascertain why destiny had taken him from his books and made him a colonel of artillery. The only man of action in the family, the sailor, Prince theorge, has disappeared from view, but his friends say that he does nothing but which fled his hands at the critical perled and reduced the Greek fleet to igne: hie inaction. Rumor says that he has quarrelled with his father, and would have no compunction in taking over the

The last Garibaldians have left Athens and the air of the capital no longer throbs with their wailings. On their way from the front, they did little but shout about their shameful betrayal by the Greek commanders. When they reached Athens they screamed that they had been robbed. Many of them are young fellows of good families, whose fond parents loaded them with fine raiment and jewelry. They had to exchange their finery for uniforms before proceeding to the front. What was their indignation upon returning to find their finery gone! The completeness of the loot would have justified the belief that the Turks had been in charge of the warehouses. The military authorities at Athens protested that there was some hideous mistake. The things must have been mistaken for war stores and sent to the front, or served out to reservists when the stock of uniforms was exhausted. Anyhow, they were not where they ought to be. Letters with remittances also were gone.

The Meeting of Ambassadors. Constantinople, June 5 .- At the meeting between the Ambassadors of the powers and the Turkish Minister for Foreign Affairs, Tewfik Pasha, on Thursday last, at the Tophano Palace, Sir Philip Currie, the British Ambassa-dor; M. Cambon, the French Ambassador, and Signor Pansa, the Italian Ambassador, it now appears, made a distinct declaration against the retrocession of Thessaly to Turkey. This attitude of the three Ambassadors named is regarded as being of the highest political importance in view of the fact that since the Czar's telegram to the Sultan, there has been a marked rapprochement between Russia and Germany. Here the opinion is expressed that the indications point to a resuscitation of the league of the three Emperors, if that league is not already an accomplished fact.


