HAVE YOU EARNED A MEDAL? Those Who Served in the Fenian Raids or the Red River Expedition are Entitled to One.

proved of the bestowal, by the government of Canada, of medals for service in the Fenian raids of 1866 and 1870, and the Red River expedition of 1870, the "Medals Claim Board" has decided that the following are entitled to the decoration: All surviving officers, non. com. officers and men, who during the operations in question, (1) performed active service in the field, or (2) served under orders from competent authority as guards at any point where an attack from the enemy was expected,

or (3) were detailed by competent

authority from some specific or special

One medal will be issued by board to any individual. With each medal there will be a clasp granted indicating the occasion on which the services for which the medal is granted where rendered, and to those who served in campaigns subsequent to that for which the medal is granted there will be issued, in addition, a clasp for each such campaign.
