Gen. Pando's Strength. London, June 14 .- The Madrid corres pondent of the Standard says: The army corps under General Blanco in Eastern Cuba is composed of four divisions, under Generals Linares, Luque, Aldaze and March, stationed respectively at Sanitago, Holguin, Manzanillo and Puerto Principe. General Linares has 8,000 men, who, with the 2,575 under Admiral Cervera, are considered by the Government as sufficient to repel invasion. There is a hopeful feeling here that Germany will interfere in the Philippines.

Pigeons Fly 400 Miles. Toronto, June 14.—The Dominion Messenger Pigeon Association's fifth race was scheduled to take place on Saturday last from South Bend, Ind., to Toronto, 407 miles. The pigeons were liberated on Saturday morning by Mr. Sibley at five minutes to 6, Toronto time. The pigeons of Messrs. THEY KILLED 1,000.

Massacre in Sierra Leone Africa-English Missionaries at the Mercy of Savages.

Liverpool, June 13 .- Steamers which have arrived from Sierra Leone report that a thousand persons were killed in the recent uprising in that district. One hundred and twenty inhabitants of Free Town, most of them traders, are known to have been massacred, and other colonists were carried into the bush by the warboys and undoubtedly met a worse fate. Three hundred friendly natives were killed, and besides the white missionaries, six colored missionaries of the United Brethren of Christ were murdered. The English missionaries are at the mercy of the warboys, but have not been molested.

NEW YORK AND OTTAWA R. R.

Proposal to Double Capital Stock to Be Considered at Albany.

Albany, N.Y., June 13.-The State New York & Ottawa Railway Company to increase its capital stock from \$1,480. According to a special despatch from 000 to \$3,000,000, and a hearing will be given on the company's application at Syracuse on June 21. The railroad was formed last October by a merging of the Northern New York Railroad and the New York & Ottawa line, and it extends from Tupper Lake through the Northern Adirondacks to the St. Lawrence River. This increase in its capital is desired in order to enable it to acquire the stock of the Ottawa & New York Railway Company of Canada and of the Cornwall Bridge Company. When these corporations are absorbed, it will form a line through to Ottawa, shorter by about 57 miles than the present route from New

NEW AFRICAN CONVENTIO

That Satisfies the Demands of the Tw Nations Interested-What Great Britain Holds and What France Secures-Ninety Years of Reciprocity for the West

Const Colonies,

London, June 14.-The Anglo-French convention, with reference to the disputed territory in the Niger Valley, was signed yesterday. France agrees to evacuate Kissi, Roria, Ahigere, Klam, Houssa, Gomba and Ilo, but she retains Nikki. Furthermore, on the left bank of the Niger, the French get a triangular piece of territory, whose base extends from Say to Ilo. In return they give Great Britain Bornu, including the portion east of the meridian passing through Barna. On the



THE DISPUTED TERRITORY. right bank of the Niger the French got the country from Say to Ilo, and also Gurma. Beyond this they grant 30-year

leases of bonded areas at Liabe and facilities for transit in bond. This is to secure the benefit of the navigable portion of the river. In return they give 30 years of reci-

procity for the whole west coast colonies, from the Liberian frontier to the Niger. With respect to the Gold Coast, the French evacuate Wa and probably Pumu and Leo. In return Great Britain gives up Bonu and Dawkita and accepts the Volta as the best natural boundary. The French retain Moss, which they have held for 18 months.

CHINA AND BRITAIN.

England Acquires Territory and Gains Strategical Point-Jamieson's Raid Officers Reinstated

London, June 14.-In the House of Lords yesterday, the Marquis of Salisbury, replying to the Earl of Camperdown, Liberal, confirmed the reports of the concessions granted to Great Britain in the vicinity of Hong-Kong, which, he said, in addition to giving a slight extension to the colony, also secured strategical surroundings which so far commanded Hong-Kong, that in case of war Great Britain would have been put to certain disadvantages. The concessions. the Premier pointed out, had become imperative in consequence of the events of the last few years. He could not say that any immediate danger was apprehended. In fact, the concessions had been demanded for a long time, but, "recent events made the Chinese Government more sensible to the possibility of unexpected occurrences, and they quite understand and appreciated the solicitude displayed for the maintenance of peace and the commercial interests of Great Britain,

The Hon. Sir Joseph Adolphe Chapleau was the son of the late Pierre Chapleau by his wife Zoe Sigouin. He was born at St. Therese de Blainville, Que., on November 9th, 1840. He was educated at the College there and at St. Hyacinthe. On leaving college he went to Montreal to take up the study of law. In 1861 he was criminal practice, He practiced law in Montreal, and was created a Q.C. by the Earl of Dufferin in 1873. At the age of nineteen he entered the political world and appeared frequently on the hustings. His eleguence as a speaker, both in the in French. He was a thorough master of the language, and his fluent and forcible diction won for him marked respect. His English, though slightly less admirable than his French, was such as to place him in the front rank of political debat-

came Solicitor-General in the Ouimet Administration, Feb. 1878, being afterwards made Provincial Secretary under Mr. de Boucherville when the latter was dismissed by Lieut.-Gov. Lettelier de St. Just. In 1878 he was chosen leader of the Conservative Opposition in the Quebec Assembly, acting as such until Oct., 1879, when he became Provincial Premier. In July, 1882, he exchanged places with the late Mr. Mousseau, who was the Secretary of State at Ottawa. He continued in the Abbott Ministry after Sir John A. Macdonald's death, being First Secretary of State, and then for a short time Minister of Customs. He was appointed Lieut .-Governor of Quebec, December 7th, 1892. Deceased served as a Commissioner in 1884 for the purpose of investigating and reporting on the subject of Chinese immigration into Canada. In 1887 His Honor received the Roman Decoration of St. Gregory the Great; in 1882 that of the Legion of Honor of France, and in 1896 was appointed a K.C.M.G. For some years deceased was a member of the Law Faculty of Laval University, from which he held a degree of LL.D., and of whose Council he was a member at the time of his death. Among other positions he was a director of several financial corporations. In November, 1874. Sir Adolphe married Marie Louise, daughter of Lieut.
