States marines, under L'eut.-Col. Robert W. Huntington, made their first aggressive movement against the Spanish guerillas today, and completely routed the enemy. The force of marines was under Capt. THE MERRIMAC EXPLOIT.

Uncle Sam Recognizes the Services of Lieut. Hobson's Daring Band-Promotions Announced.
