Four Very Interesting Sestions Held-Thoughtful Papers and Ben:ficial a late member of the Association. Discussions.

The East Victoria Teachers' Association met in the North Ward school Thursday, May 25th. After the rollcall the minutes of the last convention were read and approved.

He said that the child is surrounded by natural objects, that it begins to observe before it can talk, and it is from these objects it obtains a great deal of its education, hence it is very necessary that this science should be taught in schools. He spoke of the character of the selections from our P. S. Readers, which require a knowledge of this science on the part of the teacher, and suggested as a pian of work the study of natural objects, after which he would use the

information as basis for composition. Mr. Couch gave a paper on "Literature in Public Schools." He stated that the P. S. teacher had all the preliminary work, or all the drudgery, of preparing the pupils to appreciate the beauties of the literature, then, when they have reached an age at which they can better appreciate the study, they pass into the hands of the Collegiate teachers, who go on with the more difficult, but also more enjoyable work. Mr. Couch also said, about one-fourth of the examination papers were really questions on literature, while the remaining three-fourths dealt with his-

torical, philological and other facts. In leading the d's ussion Mr. Mc-Auley said that literature was a very extens ve subject, including nearly every subject on the curriculum, hence questions, historical, etc., are parts of literature, as the child cannot understand the extracts where such allusions occur unless they are


