EMPIRE DAY. Fittingly Honored in Lindsay Schools

LOYALTY TO QUEEN AND COUNTRY The Theme of the Various Addresses—Interesting Programs Listened to by Many Delighted Visitors.

The setting apart of one day in the school year, on which the patriotic and loyal sentiment imbued by the scholars from the everyday work of the year should find expression, was a happy thought of the Hon. the Minister of Education.

CENTRAL SCHOOL. At the Central School the program commenced at 2:30 sharp. The pupils of all the rooms, except those of the Entrance class, participated in the proceedings.

THE SEPARATE SCHOOL. Empire Day was celebrated at the Separate School by appropriate exercises. In the morning instructive lectures were delivered to the pupils by their teachers, and in the afternoon by the parents and others interested in the school assembled, who were delighted with the program, which was as follows:

SOUTH WARD SCHOOL.

The teachers and pupils in the South Ward school spared themselves nothing in their efforts to make the celebration of Empire Day a complete success, and now have the satisfaction of receiving most hearty congratulations from all who were present.

The room was artistically and beautifully decorated with flowers, flags and bunting. The friends of the school and parents of the children exhibited their interest in the proceedings of the day by crowding the room to its fullest capacity.

Master Jack Paul discharged the duties of chairman well and becomingly. Master Alfie Bowles read a neat speech of welcome entirely of his own composition.

"The Land of the Maple," was well rendered by the whole school. Mrs. Ethel Ketchum gave a recitation upon the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. Willie Morris favored the audience with a song.

A duet by Alvin and Orvin Pepper was well received. Randal Forte gave a patriotic recitation. Miss Lola Workman, draped in the Union Jack, splendidly recited "Britannia Drills." The chorus, "Hail! Hail! Hail!" by the school roused the spirits of the audience.

Little Kenneth Touchburn, a lad of eight years, recited "Burnah for Canada," in a captivating manner. Little Laura McConnell, another child of about eight years, sang most pleasingly.

Miss Ruby Laidlaw gave an instrumental solo. Most beautiful features of the program were the flag, wand, and military drill. Twenty-four little girls, dressed in white, and wearing pink and blue caps, each carrying a small flag, rendered the flag drill.

The Red, White and Blue, and six young boys, wearing Scotch caps and each carrying a wand with colored ribbons, gave the wand drill, singing "The Maple Leaf." Both these parties were admirably done, and the evolutions of the girls and boys were exceedingly pretty and reflect much credit upon themselves and their teachers.

In the military drill twenty boys wearing military caps and spears, captained by Master Willie Morris, gave a splendid exhibition of how well young boys may be taught to drill. At the conclusion of the drill they sang "Soldiers of the Queen."

Stirring and patriotic addresses were made by Rev. J. McFarlane, Col. Deacon and Messrs. Thos. Stewart and F. C. Taylor. During the rendering of this long programme the behaviour of and the order kept by the children was most exemplary.

All the pupils performed their respective parts well with very few mistakes, reflecting very much credit upon their teachers. The teachers—Misses Cameron, Weir, and Weldon—are to be congratulated upon the success of the entertainment.

EAST WARD SCHOOL.

Canada's first Empire Day was celebrated in the East Ward school right royally. The pupils of the different classes assembled at 2:30 p.m. in Miss Fanning's room, which had been very tastefully decorated by the pupils with red, white and blue bunting, flags, maple leaves and flowers.

The program opened with a speech by the chairman, Master James Hartley, who in a few well-chosen words, expressed his hearty welcome to the parents and friends who were present, and referred to the life and character of our good Queen, who has done so much for England's power, and stated that her greatness is due to her trust in God.

Mr. S. Fox, M.P.P., gave a brief speech on Canada's resources, beauty and extent, and urged the boys and girls to be obedient and faithful to duty. In conclusion, he said that as England expects every man to do his duty, so Canada looks to the boys and girls to faithfully perform, each and every duty that lies near them.

During the afternoon the school was visited by his honor Judge Harding, Councilor G. B. Smith, the identifying and Principal Broderick. The first two gentlemen gave brief but appropriate addresses.

Hearty votes of thanks were tendered by the scholars to all the speakers and friends. "God Save the Queen," closed a pleasant afternoon.

LOCAL ENGINE-MEN AND TRACK MEN MEET LAST EVENING

There will be developments in a few days—A Mass Meeting of all Railway men will be held here tomorrow (From Saturday's Daily).

Since the U. S. H. Trackmen's strike there have been mutterings of trouble on this portion of the Middle Division. The engine-men, who now have several delegates in Montreal pressing for high wages, feel that they are exposed to unusual danger on this division as a result of the trackmen's strike.

Several strong resolutions were framed and adopted last evening, and will be forwarded to the Montreal delegates for presentation to the G. T. R. management.

We understand that a mass meeting of all the local Trackmen will be held tomorrow to consider the situation and concert measures to obtain recognition of the Trackmen's claims and release the drivers, conductors, firemen, and trainmen from the travel, public from the strain induced by the present unguarded condition of the line.

MASS MEETING HELD HERE SUNDAY

It was Largely Attended—An Ultimatum Forwarded to the Company. (From Monday's Daily).

The unrest and dissatisfaction among the men of this division of the G. T. R., arising out of the Trackmen's strike and the demand of the engineers for increased pay, culminated Sunday in a mass-meeting of the several classes of employees in the Brotherhood hall.

All the men who were not out with specials were in hand, and it was plain to the uninitiated that something unusual was in the air.

The session opened the situation was discussed with considerable warmth. The sympathy was with the striking trackmen, and some speakers proposed allowing the G. T. R. management a very short time in which to render justice to the oppressed and disaffected employees.

Local Bridge Carpenters Dismissed. Because They Would not Act as Track Repairs—Bid Wash-out at Orillia Last Evening.

The discontent of the local G. T. R. trackmen has been accentuated by the attempt of the management to compel the bridge carpenters to perform their duties.

On Saturday the Lindsay men under Foreman John Rear, received instructions to patrol the line from Lindsay to Whetby, going one day and returning the next. They demurred, stating that they were willing to do anything but to go to work on the line.

What Organizer Low Says Concerning the Men's Claims. "The public are knowing a little about the trackmen for the first time."

Mr. Low remarked on Wednesday to a Montreal Witness reporter. "The strike is a good advertisement for them. The engineers know the importance of this body, but the public has hardly ever heard of them."
