LOYALTY TO QUEEN AND COUNTRY

The Theme of the Various Addresses-Interesting Programs Listened to by Many Delighted Visitors.

The setting apart of one day in the school year, on which the patriotic and loyal sentiment imbibed by the scholars from the everyday work of the year should find expression, was a happy thought of the Hon. the Minister of Education. The staffs of the town schools almost without exception entered heartily into the work of preparation, and the afternoon of Tuesday found teachers and pupils alike charged with the spirit of the day.

CENTRAL SCHOOL.

At the Central School the program commenced at 2.30 sharp. The pupils of all the rooms, except those of the Entrance class, participated in the proceedings. The room, having been tastefully decorated with evergreens and flags, presented a pleasing appearance, and the program consisted mainly of readings, recitations and choruses, all of a patriotic nature.

In the early part of the entertainment, Mr. McNeillie, chairman of the Board of Education, accompanied by his honor Judge Harding, and others, dropped in for a few minutes, and before retiring, the above-named gentlemen each addressed a few kind and encouraging words to the pupils and their friends.

After the children had rendered their part of the proceedings, short addresses were given by Dr. Herriman, Mr. R. J. McLaughlin and Rev. Mr. Marsh. A very enjoyable hour was then closed by the singing of the national anthem.

NORTH WARD SCHOOL

The North Ward and Francis-st. schools, together with a number of the parents and friends of the children, met in the North Ward building on Tuesday afternoon to celebrate our first Empire Day. The meeting was opened with "God Save the Queen," after which addresses were given by Inspector Knight, Mr. J. D. Flavelle and Rev. Mr. Manning. These were interspersed with suitable songs and recitations by the children. Mr. Knight spoke on the loyalty or

patriotism of our town, as shown by the naming of our streets in honor of some member of the Royal Family. Mr. Flavelle spoke on the meaning of patriotism, developing the idea that to be a true patriot means not only making the best of one's self, but also helping to make the best of each individual in the nation of which we form a part. Rev. Mr. Manning stated that every nation has a destiny, and then proceeded to show that if England fulfilled her destiny as the greatest nation of the world, she must do it by retaining her schools and churches, and continuing to act upon the princi-
