Professor Shuttleworth, of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, was then called on to give his address. Before starting he stated that he was present at the Institute's annual meeting at no expense to the Institute but as Professor Chemistry at the College, he had time at his disposal to visit and address Institutes in different parts of the province. His address was pronounced by those present to be most comprehensive and instructive, and imparted knowledge which would be invaluable to every farmer in the province. His subject was "Soil and Tillage." He said that though soils by analysis may be divided into numerous elements showing a complex composition, practically soil may be regarded as composed of mineral and of vegetable matter. The former furnishes to the plant that which remains upon burning the plant, and which is called ash, It is of the greatest importance to have a regular supply of available miner-al matter for the plant during its period of growth, and a minimum quantity only of this is washed out of soil by rains. afethods of cultivation securing these conditions were discussed in detail by the speaker. The vegetable matter is the source of soil in humus, which by its constant and gradual decomposition liberates plant food. action of humus in warming soil, admitting air, retaining moisture, and collecting and supplying plant food, was explained.
