GRAND TRUNK STRIKE

House of Commons Discusses the Unfortunate Situation.

EFFORTS OF THE PREMIER.

Sir Wilfrid was negotiating with Mr. Wainwright when Messrs. Powell, Taylor and Clarke went to Montreal - Sympathy with Strikers - Statement of Mr. Powell - Obstruction Again.

Ottawa, June 8.—The trackmen's strike again formed the chief subject of discussion in the House yesterday. The question being introduced by Mr. W. F. Mackenzie, Messrs. Powell and Taylor, who conducted the negotiations with the management of the G.T.R. on behalf of the striking trackmen, made statements and produced correspondence in support of their contention that faith had not been kept with the men. Sir Wilfrid Laurier during the debate informed the House that he had been negotiating with the G.T.R. for a settlement of the strike, but that he had not been accepted as mediator by the strikers.

Mr. Maclean said: Before the orders of the day are called, I would like, in the name of the House, to draw the attention of the Government and the House to the fact that the G.T.R. has been making a statement that has been made this morning in connection with the evening papers in connection with the strike.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER: Premier Offers His Services in That Capacity to Mr. Hays.

Ottawa, June 12.—Mr. James Sutherland carried to Montreal a renewed offer of Prime Minister's services—Immediate Settlement Desired by Sir Wilfrid—Must Be No Revenge on Individual Strikers.

Ottawa, June 12.—Mr. James Sutherland, yesterday morning left for Montreal to act as the representative of the Prime Minister in endeavoring to effect a settlement of the G.T.R. trackmen's strike. Sir Wilfrid has been in New York telegraphically communicating with General Manager Hays.

Mr. Taylor referred to his meeting with Mr. Wainwright, and related the subsequent proceedings of the same man and himself very briefly. He said that he had already done by Mr. Taylor. He also gave a number of instances in which men who claimed they had not interfered had been refused in the G.T.R. in the discussion with Mr. Hays.

Mr. Hays said that he had been in Montreal that every credit was due to the striking trackmen, and that an accident of any kind which happened and nothing was done about it. There was some trouble at Kingston, but it was caused by the trackmen, and he was told by one of the conductors that the trackmen themselves interfered to prevent that trouble.
