COMMUNICATIONS. CARDEN. Impressions of Lindsay and its People -An Interesting Letter from a Reg-

I first became acquainted with Lindsay when on a short visit to the family of the late Judge Smith somewhere in the sixties. My impressions of the place at that time may be summed up in one wordrough. It had then, as now, its splendidly wide Kent street. But within a stone's throw of this fine street, cows and geese roamed at will among the stumps in the vacant lots. Speaking of stumps, I thought there were more of these in this town to the square acre than in any place I had ever seen outside of a farm clearing.

The word I have used to describe my impressions of the place will convey, not inaptly, my impressions of the people at that time; but this term, under the circumstances, carries no disgrace with it. The fire had most severely scorched the long before; the community evidently was not wealthy; and man must have an assured abundance of the necessaries of life before he can give a thought to its refine
before he can give a thought to its refine
boys (No. 46) presented an appearance second to none in camp.

HOLIDAYS.—The schools of the vicinity are closed and scholars are enjoying a much needed respite from school. Mr. Arbut are recovering. The board of health but are recovering. Everyone seemed to be engaged in struggling for a living, in recovering from losses, or in laying the foundations of a well-to-do-ness yet to be reached. No wonder, then, that little at-tention was given to personal appearance or womanly adornment. But any lack of exterior attractivenes on the part of the people was more than compensated for by their warm-heartedness and hospitable attention to strangers. It seemed to me that the Lindsayites only needed to be assured that a man was decent and respectreception of a stranger and won his heart.

After that visit of nearly thirty years ago
my acquaintance with Lindsay was limited to an occasional passage through the
place until some eight years ago, when I had occasion to make a stay of some weeks in the town. The progress the place had made in the meantime was evident on every side. Cow pastures and stumps had ceased to be a feature of the principal streets; their place was taken by substantial residences, with an abundance of lawn and garden neatly fenced in, or by com-fortable cottages of a humbler kind. The streets were well graded, but badly kept; for on all but the business part of Kent-st. the gutters abounded with worn-out tin-pails, pans, kettles and other nondescript articles of this class, with the remains of repaired aidewalks and with prunings of trees from adjacent gardens. I had occasion to visit the town again for some days recently. My impression is that Lindsay has advanced in the last eight years as much as it had in the previous twenty or more. Though there is much plainness about the stores-outside and inside—they are all well lighted by electricity, are still sadly lacking in tidiness; the sidewalks as a whole are simply wretched; there is an attempt at boulevarding on driving there via Newcastle. many of the residential streets, shade trees have been liberally planted and are fairly well taken care of. The population must have increased by 1,500 or 2,000 within the last eight years, if one may judge from the number of houses, suitable to laboring men, mechanics and artisans, that have been built within that time, especially in the south and west of the town. County Bridges.

A combined committee of the counties of borough on Monday last, for the purpose of trying to arrive at an amicable settlement as to the proportion of the cost of construction of the Pigeon Creek and Bobosygeon bridges each oounty should bear. Victoria was represented by E. H. Hopkins, reeve of Ops, Dr. Cornwall, reeve of Emily, Mr. Switzer, reeve of Mariposa, and the warden; and Peterborough by the warden, and Messrs Casement, Burnham, Maloney, Sanderson and Anderson. Victoria offered to assume three-tenths of the cost of the Pigeon Creek bridge and seven-tenths of the

Bobcaygeon bridges. The offer was declined by Peterborough. Peterborough offered to contribute one-half of the cost of the Pigeon Creek bridge and one quarter the cost of the Bobcaygeon bridges, which Victoria declined. The committee broke up without reaching any

Reports of damage done by the big storm of Friday afternoon show that west of Lindsay, in Eldon and Thorah townships, it assumed the dimensions of a veritable cyclone. Near Beaverton it was exceptionally severe, and swept a path about a mile wide, levelling everything in its course. It swept through T. C. Hodgkinson's and Hector Grant's bush, levelling every tree of any size to the ground. Thos. McEachern's large barn in course of construction was demolished, and Mr. Bennet and son at work on the building were caught by the falling timbers. Bennet was so seriously injur-ed that he died from the effects, but the son ed that he died from the effects, but the son recovered. The barns of Messrs, Hecter Grant Neil Westcott, Jas. Waddell and Mrs. Mc-Dougall were unroofed, and Chas. Westcott's barn and dwellings of Peter McDougall. Francis Ducette and Allan McLean were blown to pieces. Miles of fences were levelled, and whole fields of grain beaten to the ground. At Kirkfield Mr. Wm. McKenzie's fine residence was badly damaged; the cheese factory was wrecked, and Gusty's hotel also suffered. At Palestine, about three and a half miles north of Kirkfield, Mr. Donald McArthur's barn was unroofed, and many other farmers suffered. A gentleman who drove from Kirkfield to Lorneville Wednesday counted no less than fifteen ed, carried one hundred yards and dropped close to the back door of the dwelling.
