THE FARMER'S GARDEN.

An Apparently Sensible Plan Suggested by Farm and Home.

Every farmer ought to have one acre of garden fenced with woven wire and lath, or so the chickens will not trouble it. That acre should be long and all rows run the entire length of the ground so that the horse can be used in cultivating. The site, if it can run over a knoll so as to give southern and northern slopes, will prolong the fruiting season about ten days.

Plant potatoes or peas next to the strawberries, so that the ground will be in good condition for your next two rows of strawberries. Plant all rows through the whole length of the garden, and wide enough so that you can cultivate with a horse.
