MONTREAL'S FIREBUGS.

The Information Regarding Their Plots Came From New York.

Montreal, July 22.-Despite official statement from New York that the detectives there knew nothing of the Canadian gang of firebugs, there is good ground for the belief that the arrest of Jenkins and Hayes in this city by the Canadian secret service will produce evidence of a gigantic conspiracy with manufacturers in the principal cities of the United States and Canada. The arrest of Jenkins and Hayes is only the lirst step. The Crown officials and detectives have a mass of incriminating evidence, which, it is believed, will lay bare the whole plot.

Jenkins is said to have made a full onfession, which will incriminate many others. The detectives will not divulge the details of the confession, but state that Jenkins has given important information. Their statement seems to be true, as Jenkins had a private examination in the jail, while an open court examination was given Hayes.

A press despatch says that the New York detectives claim to know nothing about the gang. As a matter of fact the information that led to the arrest first came from New York. Holmes was evidently taken by surprise, and the little spark of confidence he had managed to retain instantly vanished. That nerve which was Holmes' chief characteristic was now nowhere to be seen. He plainly displayed his feelings.

The district attorney saw his predicament, and so did Mr. Barlow. They never lost a moment in hurling questions at him, which he answered without much effort. For fully two hours Holmes was persuaded to give a corrected account of his doings from Indianapolis to Toronto. There were some slight variations from the tales previously spun by Holmes, but in the main his story was merely a repetition of his repeated falsehoods.

to his rotting body." In describing the scene connected with M. Stambuloff's funeral, the same journal says that educated people were going about the streets of Sofia calling upon the public to curse Stambuloff's body for the last time.

The Russian press, after commenting with tact and dignity upon the assassination of M. Stambuloff, speaks contemptuously of the implacable hostility shown to Russia by the journals of England, Germany, Austria and Italy in blaming this country for an outrage to which it was quite a stranger.

Milaroff was one of 18 prisoners tried at Sofia in 1892 for complicity in a number of different plots which culminated in the murder of the Bulgarian Minister, Beltcheff, Milaroff, who had been one of those concerned in the kidnapping of Prince Alexander, was convicted of having conspired with a hostile Government-namely, that of Russia-of having plotted the murder of Prince Ferdinand, and of arming Bulgarian subjects for purposes of sedition and murder.
