THE MASSACRE OF ARMENIANS

Mr. Gladstone Writes on the

Fifteen of Them Wore Slain at Van Last Week-Russia Protests Against the Sale of Her Young Men to Foreign Armies-Other

Cable News.

London, June 25.-The Chronicle will to-morrow publish a letter from Mr. Gladstone on the subject of the Armenians, in which he says: "Nobody uses language half strong enough against the Sultan and his agents. To describe their guilt is beyond all bounds, and the language ought to go beyond all bounds. My choice is between far out-Heroding everybody and absolute silence, for my language abstractedly might plausibly be ascribed to temper, whereas it would be perfectly cold-blooded. I am silent only for fear of doing harm. The European mind wants plausible excuses to cover its disgrace. I do not wish to furnish

The Constantinople correspondent of The Chronicle telegraphs that the Armenian losses during the recent rioting at Van are estimated to have been 1500 killed while the Turks' loss was 200. The despatch adds that the Kurds are gathering from all directions for the purposes of thieving.

RUSSIA MAKES A PROTEST.

She Doesn't Want Her Young Men Sold Into Other Armies.

St. Petersburg, June 25 .- The Cabinet has addressed a strong note to Berlin, protesting against the action of the German agents of English and Hollandish colonial armies in luring Russian youths across the frontier with promises of money, in order to sell them to foreign recruiting masters. The price paid is usually 20 marks, and numerous cases are on record where Russian parents conducted the arrangements in the selling of their sons to the highest bidder.

MISSED THE GUILLOTINE.

Spend lits Life in Prison.

Paris June 25 .- The sentence of death passed at Doual upon the Frenchmen Raoul Tremblie, who was convicted of the 'murder in Buenos Ayres of another Frenchman named Francois Faros, has been commuted to penal servitude for life. The motive of the rime, which was committed two years ago, was robbery. The body of the murdered man was cut into a cozen pieces and scattered about the City of Buenos Ayres. Tremblie fled to France, but the authorities at Buenos Ayres. who had traced the murder to him, cabled for his arrest, and upon his arrival at Dunkirk he was taken into custody. His victim having been a Frenchman, Tremblie was tried at the Doual Assizes and convicted. He was sentenced to be guillotined, but appealed and was granted a new trial, but was again found guilty and condemned to death.

Rome, June 25 .- The Pope held a public consistory to-day, at which the four prelates who were elevated to the cardinalate on June 22 received their hats. The new cardinals are Mgrs. Ferrata, Cretoni, Jacobini and Agli-

The Trouble in Crete.

London, June 25 .- In the House Commons to-day Rt. Hon. George N. Curzon, Parliamentary Secretary to the Foreign Office, stated that the representatives of the powers at Constantinople were in entire accord as regards Crete and had jointly urged the Porte to maintain order in that island.

YELLOW FEVER IN CUBA.

A Fear at Washington That the Disease Will Recome Epidemic-The U.S.

Taking Precautions. Washington, June 26 .- The most alarming report from Cuba with respect to yellow fever comes from Sagua La Grande, where the marine service is advised by its last report there are 41 cases and 4 deaths. It is expected that within a very short time the fever will become epidemic. and if it does not become virulent in the city of Havana all previous periences will be set aside. The partment has, however, received advices to the effect that cholera has appeared anywhere on the island. The present war and its relation to the sanitary conditions of Cuba is referred to in the last annual report of Surgeon-General Wyman, and the statement ther made which report the conditions of this summer, only in a more aggravated form. On this subject General Wyman then said that the insurrection had interfered to a great extent in the transmission of exact information from the disturbed provinces and the normal condition of health in the island had been largely modified by the presence of a great body of non-immune Spanish soldiers. These persons have taken the disease and added to the natural number of cases annually prevalent in that issummer will be met with again this year. Absolute knowledge as to the number of troops stricken with the disease is denied by the Spanish Governinto the United States of yellow fever.

Constantinople, June 24.-Advices received here from Van, Asia Minor, say that in the outbreak which occurred there on Monday four hundred Armenians were killed, and that the trouble was renewed yesterday. A large number of persons have taken reruge in the British Consulate. The massacre is ascribed to agents of the Porte, wno were paid to provoke a demonstration on the part of the Armenians which might serve as a pretext for a general slaughter of Christians.
