—One of the men employed on the new town hall at Haliburton fell off a scaffold on other day and sustained painful injuries.

—Oakwood and Little Britain districts were visited by an exceedingly heavy rain-storm Tuesday afternoon, and considerable grain was levelled.

—We were informed on Saturday that the Mammy pea crop had been completely destroyed by the present hot spell, but fancy peas promise to be a fine crop.

—Yr. Dennis Hawkins, of Woodville, the well-known breeder of Barbours and shipped a fine stock getter weighing about 600 lbs. to J. T. Russell, a Verulam farmer, last week.

—The barn of Mr. W. G. Archer, near Minden, was struck by lightning and consumed with all its contents last Monday. Archer was absent doing road work at the time.

—A garden party is to be held on Friday evening next, at the residence of Mr. Hazkiah Noble, and the success of the Little Britain Christian church. Tables set at 7 o'clock p.m.

—Mr. John Dorgan, hotel-keeper, received the melancholy news on Wednesday that his sister, Mrs. Mary Casey, had passed away at Ishpeming, Mich., where she had been living for some years.

—We understand that young Barry, who lost his reason Sunday night, is now much better. He was examined by Magistrate McLaughlin and returned answers to most of his questions.

—Two cartloads of cheese came over the L. E. & O. R. on Wednesday from Bancroft. It is thought that most of the cheese from the many factories in that district will be shipped out this way in future.

—Mr. Dennis Sully, cattle drover, shipped a carload of fine fat steers for Buffalo Friday. One of the animals, brought in by young Mr. Fox, of Bonny, indulged in a hurdle racing in the south ward, not liking the noise around the railway line.

—Races were held at Trenton last week. Big purses were offered and a large number of horses entered the events. When the prize money came to be paid the secretary had disappeared with the funds, and as a result the horsemen are out a good amount of money.

—The Port Hope Gaule notes that Mr. John Vance of Wrentham, was the tallest man in the Orange procession in that town on Monday. His Lindsay friends are quite prepared to believe the statement, and as John is growing—in popularity, if not in stature.

—Tuesday Mr. McMillan sent off another batch of cattle to Lord's farm, Balsam lake. The lot comprised 25 head, and the majority were fine big animals.

—Havana and Key West dispatches have vivid imaginations.

Word comes from Mexico of the discovery of a cheap and safe hypnotic in the common white zapote seed. It is said to produce a tranquil sleep, leaving no unpleasant after effects, and producing no appetite for the drug. It is hailed as a boon to medical men who treat the insane, while it will probably be of great use in the average physician's practice.

It seems strange that United States protectionists should be so opposed to their own methods when practised by Germany. They specially provide that the duty levied on German sugar on which a bounty has been paid shall be high enough to offset the cheapening effect of the bounty. They argue that the German people to furnish Yankees with sugar at less than cost is to do Yankee an injury. Yet every Yankee in private life regards cheapness and plenty as an unmixed good. John Bull, on the other hand, takes all the less than cost good things that come his way and devotes his own energies to producing things that do not have to be sold at less than cost. And he grows rich by that common sense plan.

E. King Dadds, of Toronto, a life-long conservative, and one of the orators of that party in past campaigns, writes as follows regarding the leaders of his party in the paper which he publishes:

"We are told that these same men are to take hold and lead the conservatives of Ontario in the coming fight for control of the local legislature. Better a thousand times that the party should be in opposition another quarter of a century than to be added with such a discredited lot to the men who at the present time assume to be the leaders of the conservative party. The conservative opposition, the Lord knows, is already weak enough without being weighed down with these Ottawa parasites, and the very fact that such a combination has been announced by many conservatives is, in our judgment, largely responsible for the lack of enthusiasm displayed at many of the political meetings lately held by the opposition leader."

The Canada Presbyterian does not see how the action of the senate can be regarded as a party question. The senate has practically set the fiat of the people at naught, and our contemporary rightly says, "this country cannot be ruled by a house of lords who would persist in opposition to the will of the people, and it concludes: "The merits of the question in dispute does not concern us now; that will be soon set right if our senators permit us to posing as masters of the situation and rulers of the country. If a party detached at the polls could take its revenge in that way, our parliamentary life would be thrown into utter confusion, and conflicts more bitter than anything heretofore recently known, brought about. The senate can do useful work without becoming a mere party machine, and provoking an 'end it or mend it' controversy."

The new act regulating the hours of women and children in shops is now in force. It provides that no "child, young girl or woman" shall be employed in a shop before seven a.m., or after six p.m., or on Saturday or on the day next before any statutory holiday before seven a.m., or after 10 p.m., and that there shall be allowed to every "child, young girl or woman" not less than one hour for the noon day meal on each day, and when employed after six in the evening, not less than forty-five minutes for another, or evening meal. A provision allows any "child, young girl or woman" to be employed on one day other than Saturday, and the day before a statutory holiday in any week until the hour of ten in the evening, but in that case the employee shall not be employed on Saturday in such week after 6 p.m. "Christmas week" is excepted. As "woman" is safely defined in the act as one "eighteen and upwards," no difficulty will occur in the way of definition. A "young girl" is one under eighteen and over fourteen.

TORONTO MARKETS.

Toronto, July 14.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK MARKET.

There was a light run of live stock at the market yesterday, and the market offered for sale, consequently the market was not very active. The prices for the week were not very different from those of the week before. The market for heavy cattle was not very active, and the prices for light cattle were somewhat higher than for heavy cattle.

Stocks were not quite so high, and sold at \$2.00 to \$2.75. Feeders were worth \$3.25 and several loads were bought by H. Peter and St. George's A. Bader of Thornbury.

Milk cows were not plentiful, especially in the morning, and there were only about a dozen of all kinds offered. Prices ranged all the way from \$20 for inferior to \$40 for superior ones.

Cattle are lower in price and sold at \$2 to \$3 each.

The demand for sheep has fallen off somewhat, and prices are much lower. They sold at \$3 to \$3.25 and the great bulk went to the buyers of the latter price.

Lambing is well advanced, and about 400 in. are expected to be ready for market in a few days. The hog market was firm to-day and prices were advanced. About 500 of all grades were offered, and the market was active.
