British Geographical Circles Taking Great Interest in the Polar Trip by Balloon

-Mr. Keltle, Secretary of the Royal Geographical Society, Gives His Views. London, July 22.-A special despatch from Copenhagen says that a carrier pigeon has been caught in the vicinity of

Tromsoe Island, near the north point stamped on its wing: "North Pole passed fifteenth." Keen interest is felt in geographical circles here as to the result of Andree's Polar expedition, and this is greatly increased by the arrival of the pigeons at Soevde and at Tromsoe Island, though

there is some doubt as to whether either bird came from Andree. It is a curious fact that the inscription "142 W., 46.62" agrees exactly with the geographical location from which the London experts believe they might hear from Andree at about this

were southerly when he ascended Aufigures '142 W.' mean the coast of North America, and if such a wind prevailed, under the most favorable circumstances, Andree would arrive there. If the m scription means this, it means also that Andree has passed right across the Pole. "The inscription is the only thing leading to the supposition that the pigeon may have come from Andree, but cannot be doubted that he will first le heard of on the extreme north of Amedca, or the Siberian coast. Supposing him to have arrived at 142 W., with a disabled balloon, he can easily ascend the Mackenzie River, and reach the Hudson Bay settlements. Of course, if the balloon is not damaged, there is no reason why he should descend until he reaches comfortable quarters,' There is no special anxiety felt here as to Andree's fate, because, even the balloon comes to grief, Andree will

They Bon't Believe It. Stockholm, July 22.-Dr. E.
