

His cheeks are sunken and his eyes have lost their brightness. Apparently he does not despair; he yet believes that his innocence will be proven and that one day his troubles will be over. He is ready to talk about his case. He said the other day: "My petition to the government is one of the biggest that ever went to Ottaws. It contains 7,000 names. I do not ask for pardon; I ask for a new trial. I have much new evidence, and I believe that if I had a chance to produce it before a jury they would at once acquit me of this awful charge.
