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BOARD OF WORKS IN SESSION. The Tenders for the South Kent Sewer Opened and General Business Discussed.

The members of the board of works met in the clerk's office last evening and spent a couple of hours discussing sewerage, a permanent improvement and the cutting down of the list of repairs to roads and walks passed by the council in the early spring. Chairman Brady said that the amount placed at the disposal of this committee was much smaller than for a number of years past, and it would be necessary to strike out work to the value of at least \$500.

On motion three tenders submitted for the construction of the Kent sewer from Lindsay-st. to William-st., south side, were opened and read. The offers were as follows: It was pointed out by Town Commissioner Pike that the proposed depth of 9 ft. would not serve all the property-owners along the line of the proposed sewer. Smyth said he thought only three parties would be inconvenienced, and they could not reasonably expect of others to pay an increased amount under the influence of a change of their connections. Finally a resolution was passed advising the adoption of the tender submitted by the contractor, Mr. P. J. Kelly, who thinks the sewer could not be constructed for the same or less money by the town.

Reference was made to the petition of Wellington-st. residents to have that street macadamized, and it was decided that the request had not been entertained by the council. Dep-reeve Smyth thought Cambridge-st. bridge should be made a first-class roadway, as it is used by carters hauling loads from the railway sheds. Town Commissioner Pike called attention to the condition of Lindsay-st. south, for which a large appropriation had been made, and Mayor Taylor said that the street had been graded and gravelled. A vote was taken and the last-named work was authorized. Mayor Taylor pointed out that the council had voted to make William-st. a model road according to Provincial Commissioner Campbell's method, and \$1,000 having been placed at the disposal of the council for the purpose, Town Commissioner Pike would be justified in beginning the work at any time. Dep-reeve Smyth had no recollection of William-st. having been chosen by the council, and it turned out that the matter had come up while he was away on a trip. He then took it upon himself to see that the work was done, and he was glad to see the motion by a two-thirds majority.

Coun. Burrows thought the council should adhere to its original intention and make a start on William-st., as it was the work of the struggle, and would take some days to strip it, and the stone crusher would be at the disposal of the town by Saturday. Chairman Brady said that suggests another plan, and that the work should be running the crusher for the open to break the stone for the town for \$1 per cord. Town Commissioner Pike thought the price reasonable; the only point to be considered was that of giving the work to town men. Coun. Burrows, seconded by Coun. O'Neill, that Commissioner Pike be authorized to proceed with William-st. as proposed. Coun. O'Neill said: "I think Mr. Pike could make a good job of the street for \$100 or so." Coun. Burrows: "It would not be permanent; for goodness sake let us do something that will last." Commissioner Pike said the drains and gutters would be a source of trouble in constructing a model road. Coun. Graham: "When I visited Kingston a few days ago I saw model road roads, but the water escapes into the sewers at every corner." Coun. Burrows' motion was not pressed. A special meeting of the council was held Monday evening, when an attempt will no doubt be made to have the goal roads money spent elsewhere than on William-st.
