AGAIN POSTPONED

The Railway By-Law is a "Will o' the Wisp"

COMMISSIONERS WILL EXPEND \$35,000 OF THE PROPOSED \$45,000 LOAN.

The Estimates of Expenditures Under the Various Departments Still in complete and will not be finally arranged till after next Monday's vote.

Pursuant to notice, a special meeting of council was held last Monday.

Mayor Walters read the following report of the committee on the proposed by-law.

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Table listing names and amounts, likely a financial report or list of contributors.

The probable lifetime of the work is twenty years.

Clerk Knowlson reported that the petition for Cambridge-st sewer was now in proper form.

Alderman Leannon, chairman of the town property committee, reported verbally that he had advertised for tenders for the projected improvements.

Alderman Leannon, chairman of the board of works read a short report recommending the appointment of three commissioners under the \$45,000 loan by-law to expend \$35,000 on street improvements.

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MUSTER OF MILITIA Seems to Have Completely Overawed London's Rioters.

THE CARS RUN UNHINDERED.

London Assuming Its Normal Aspect of a Quiet and Law-Abiding Canadian City—Action of the City Council—Aldermen Take a Firm Stand—Several Arrested.

London, July 11.—A party from the fact that the riots on Saturday and the presence of the militia and cavalry on Carling's Heights are all topics of conversation everywhere throughout the city.

The outside militia, consisting of four companies, one each from the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Bns., 21st Essex Fusiliers, Windsor; Major Acheson, 20th Infantry, Galt; Col. W. W. White, 20th Infantry, Galt; and Col. Hepler, Oxford Rifles, Woodstock, reached the city yesterday morning at 11.45 o'clock.

The estimated damage incurred by the mob Saturday is nearly \$5,000—\$4,000 of which is the company's property, and which is to be made good by the City.

In the absence of the militia, Mayor Wilson presided at the Police Court yesterday afternoon, and was assisted by the City Clerk, J. C. P. K., and the City Engineer, J. M. McEwen.

John W. Dore, non-union mobman on duty at the London Street Railway, yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, was charged with unlawfully obstructing the free passage of cars by tampering with a switch.

Details of Municipal Expenditure. (To Ed. of the Post.)

S.R.—In an editorial on "Assessment and Municipal Government" in a recent issue of The Post, you make the statement that "if a copy of the assessment rolls and a statement of the expenditures of the town of Lindsay were placed in the hands of every ratepayer, it would be surprising reading to the most of them."

On motion the clerk was instructed to return to unsuccessful tenderers the Lindsay and Glenelg-st. sewers their marked cheques, and also Mr. Lauscombe's cheque which has been returned to him.

On motion Mr. J. S. Graham was heard. He desired permission to proceed with a sewer ordinance that in the meantime the police should be instructed to strictly enforce the present by-law.

The ordinance was acknowledged, and it was proposed to adopt it as part of the report, but Alderman Crandell objected strenuously, declaring that bicyclists had been very unfairly treated all season, and it would be a great injustice to enforce the harsh by-law while the council were considering its modification.
