While some sceptically disposed persons may be inclined to think that the Algoma legislative tour, which terminated last week, was nothing but a pleasant junket for those participating it is fairly safe to prophecy that the axcursion will prove one of the best aducational schemes of recent times. For years a few enthusiastic Western Ontario men have been attempting to attract attention to this section of the province,-from Sauit Ste. Marie west to the Manitoban boundary,-and to satisfy parliament and the country generally that that territory was teeming with mineral resources and rich with agricultural possibilities. It must te confessed that hitherto their efforts has bad very small effect, but seeing is usually supposed to imply believing, and the Westerners, confident in their own knowledge of the genuineness of their gospel, were determined to compel conviction by actual demonstration. They did not ask for a public grant to run the excursion, but put their hands deep into their own pockets to meet the heavy costs of the affair. Every municipality along the proposed line of travel cordially co-operated, the itinerary was so arranged that the most and best might be seen, and the resuit cannot but be of lasting benefit and should make a handsome return to the enterprising citizens of New Ontario,

The visitors have been fairly astonished at the unexpected evidence of greatness produced-the great pulp and mineral industries at the Soo; the rich mines of the Fort William district sround Rat Portage, in the vicinity of Mine Centre, and in other sections; and the fertile belt stretching for a hundred miles or more along the Canadian bank of the placid Rainy River, all this and much more testified to the limitless possibilities of the country. The unaided efforts of the individual settler and prospector, however, can do little in a country of such vast distances. The lack of communication with the outside world seven months in the twelve, and by steamer only the balance of the year, was a handicap that would be fatal to less determined and courageous pioneers. But with a railroad running through the territory and with good roads constructed them, an immense impetus would be iven to the opening up of the counthreaten the public peace. try. Those who are already there would be encouraged and fresh settlers would go in, the mineral locations would be developed, and the mining camps springing up on every hand would create a market for the manutation and population is all the counrest, and a wise assistance rendered to the district in the near future would

quickly return a hundred fold. The great difficulty which will confront the government at the outset of any movement upon their part to render that assistance is the immensity of the need. The country is so vast and the reasonable requirements of the various sections of it would, even if only partially provided for, consume so many millions of dollars that the trouble is where to begin. At the Soo, for example, the demand

is for aid to the Central Algoma Railway, which running north to Missana-James' Bay, would open up a vast territory of spruce forests from whence could be drawn unlimited supplies of mills, and also traverse many miles of rich mineral country, the base of supplies for smelters and reduction works which will be established at this point just as quickly as there is reasonable prospect of material for them to work upon. Water power, unlimited in quantity, is right there, transportation facilities to the markets of the world are already provided, the capital is waiting investment, the railway back into the north country is the one thing heeded. This is but a sample of what was met with throughout the trip. In a subsequent article attention will be directed to other parts of the district.

WRECK NARROWLY AVERTED

The Haliburton Express had a Narroy Escape on Saturday Myening. On Saturday afternoon a tremendous storm of rain swept over the disdistrict north of Kinmount. In reality it partook of the nature of a cloudburst, as the rain fell in solid sheets. All low lands were flooded, little rivulets became rushing torrents, and the river rose and overflowed its banks. carrying away cordwood, telegraph poles and other forest produce piled,


The swiftly rolling flood undermined and carried away between 50 and 60 feet of railway embankment near Ingoldsby, the station north of Gelert, about 3.30 o'clock, and as there were no sectionmen in the immedicate vicinity the occurrence remained unnoted until shortly before the hour for the arrival of the Haliburton train from Lindsay, in charge of Conductor Jobbitt. Mr. G. W. James, postmaster at Lochlin, inspecting that the pent-up waters would cause a washout, undertook to examine the railway track and it was lucky that he did so. When he had satisfied himself of the dangerous nature of the break he ran forward and flagged the express when about a mile from the scene.

Word was at once sent to Lindsay after which the passengers and train crew were made comfortable for the night by the good people of Ingoldsby. About one o'clock Sunday morning the wrecking train arrived from Lindsay in charge of Conductor J. F. Jobbitt with Locomotive Foreman Storer, Inspector Brown, Roadmaster Mitchell and a force of sectionmen and bridge builders on board, who set to work with a will and had repairs effected by 7 a.m. The belated train reached Haliburton at 10 o'clock Sunday morning.
