Deplorable Fatality.

Monday evening last about 8 o'clock a young man named Robert Kennedy, brakeman on a freight train running from Uxbridge to Goodwood, in charge of Conductor Fair, was walking along the top of a car loaded with freshly-peeled potatoes just as a sharp curve was reached, and the unexpected and sudden stop of the car caused him to lose his balance and fall. Conductor Fair happened to be looking out of the cupola at the time, and as one gave the signal to stop the train, upon seeing the young man fall, he immediately jumped down and poor fellow was found unconscious, having been thrown about twenty feet from the track. Raising him up tenderly he was placed in a van and taken to Stouffville, where medical assistance was procured and everything possible done to restore him to consciousness. A very bad case of concussion of the brain was diagnosed. An examination made it plain that no bones were broken, and the only injury was to his feet, as the soles were discolored and swollen. Dr. Kemp of this town, G. R. Ferguson, and Dr. J. S. Laurin, Esq. were called to Stouffville Tuesday morning, but the case was beyond medical skill. The terrible shock sustained by the young man evidently caused a blood-vessel in the brain to burst, and he remained in a comatose condition until Tuesday evening, when he died. The deceased, who was just of age, was well-known in Lindsay, having been employed in the yard for some time, and was liked by everyone with whom he came in contact. He had a strong liking for the game of billiards, and was a player of pure excellence, as his behaviour as manager for Gilmour & Co., lumbermen of Trenton, attests. A very sad case indeed. The body was taken to Trenton for interment.
