PRESIDENT, FELLOW ENDEAVORS,-A TERRIFIC STORM -Orillia's civic holi- For various reasons our field of laber in is in towns and cities; yet even here we find plenty of work for willing hands and earnest endeavorers, and we know that if we but work from a pure motive and according to the best methods, by the blessi as of the Almighty God we may yet see in the country a glorious work accomplished for Christ and the church.

I believe that the work can be carried on very successfully by means of the social, the lookout, and the prayer meeting committees; yet I think that the Sunday school committee could also find many opportunities for doing valuable service in the country, especially in the summer months. The look out committee should follow as near as possible the methods recommended

by Rev. F. E. Clark in his work on the duties of the committees. As regards the social committee, the work is to a very large extent already accomplished, because from childhood the members have been well acquainted with each other, and it is very seldom that they have the opportunity of introducing

strangers. Therefore it is almost unnecessary to hold any sociable entertainments for the furtherance of mutual acquaintance; but I think that the object of associate members for Christ. But with the prayer meeting committees

it is different in some ways. This committee has full scope in the country, as elsewhere, and it is principally to the methods of conducting the prayer meeting that I intend to refer in this paper. And thirdly, by having each member act as leader as frequently as possible there is a greater interest in the meeting and a deeper sympathy for the leader on the part of the membership as a whole. One of the leaders conducts the fore part and the other the latter part of each ser-

vice. 
