COMMERCIAL NEWS.

Business—The reports received from all parts of the Dominion by the grain merchants of the city give promise of a good harvest in every part of Canada.

The Globe says—The reports received from all parts of the Dominion by the grain merchants of the city give promise of a good harvest in every part of Canada. In some provinces the yield is not so large as anticipated, while in others it is beyond expectation, and on the whole crops will be as large in quantity and of more satisfactory quality than those of last year.

The Northwest Crops—Reports on the state of the weather and the crops, and the progress made in harvesting in Manitoba, collected by the Winnipeg Free Press, were published Friday. The reports are all favorable, and two weeks more fair weather, without frost, will ensure the largest returns of first-class grain that has ever been harvested in the province and territory.

On the question of cheese inspectors, answers to some objections, 1,300,000 boxes of cheese had been put up in Canada last year; this there were in the cheese trade, the three interests to be considered, viz: the interest of the cheese makers and the interest of the buyers. Cattle—There was very little difference in Tuesday's market from that of the closing day of last week both as regards prices and general characteristics. The news from Great Britain was even more discouraging than it was last week, but some of our expert dealers say "break the market" and keep on buying. The best shipping cattle sold at 4 1/2 per lb, and in a few cases at a trifle over this figure. A large number of "short keep" and stockers changed hands again Tuesday, the former selling at 4 to per lb, and the latter at 3 to 3 1/2 per lb.
