They also ask a petition of right to sue the department for a similar sum, an injunction to restrain the gov-ernment from selling, and to prevent further seizures. The slide dues claimed amount to \$2,241, the value of lumber seized \$5,000. This, the plaintiffs claim, was already sold. They urge that their trade has been paralyzed and they have been prevented from filling orders
