How to Advertise.

Isaac Cooper, the retired member of Cooper & Conrad, Philadelphia, one of the American merchant princes, recently said to a reporter :-"I have a great liking for newspapers, for] spend more in newspaper advertising than I did before. But there is a great deal in knowing how to advertise. It is not that the methods are difficult, nor that the advertiser is constantly on a strain for something sensational. The whole secret of advertising to advantage for a retail commercial house is to tell the truth. First have then say it plainly. You don't need to monopolize the newspaper; you don't need to claim that what you say is all that is worth listening to Put the plain truth before the readers in a place where they can see it. Live up to your advertisement; keep faith with the public; and soon the public will come to put faith in your announcements. They will belive your adverunderstate what I had to offer than to overstate it, lest people should be disappointed by their own misunderstanding. After our business grew too large for me to give the business my personal attention, I hired a newspaper man to write our ads, but I made it a rule that I should see every ad before it went into the newspaper. And many a time I had to order the advertisement changed and sometimes entirely rewritten because it told a lie or would have led the people to expect something different from what we had to offer, and thus disappoint them when they should come to the store. This necessity telling the truth was perhaps greater in a Quaker town like Philadelphia than in other

A portion of the wheel entered his head behind the ear, making a terrible gash, which alone must have caused instantaneous death; but this was not the only cut or bruise, as his head and face were badly cut several other places, besides many bruises in different parts of his limbs and body. The deceased was an old resident highly respected, and the awful death he met has deeply impressed the neighborhood. He was about 55 years of age, had a good farm, and was well-to-do.-[Oshawa Vindicator.
